FANTASTIC TALE OF GERMAN BASE AT JAVA

Stores of Arms and Ammunition. Purchased in East, Said to Have Been Shipped to Batavia

San Francisco, June 29.—That the Germans are planting a military base on the Dutch island of Java, under the nose of England's largest colonial possession, to foster a revolution in India and supplementing this with a secret naval and submarine base at Batavia to prey upon the shipping of the allies is a story told here.

The purchase of enormous stores of arms and ammunition, the shipment of some of these in Dutch steamers to Batavia, and the mysterious disappearance of the rest are one feature. With the arrival of the Johnson steamer, the destination of another shipment of arms and ammunition which the steamer Annie Larsen carried out of San Diego several months ago. This shipment was purchased for the Mexican forces, it is said, at the time, but the Annie Larsen ran to Socorro Is-

land, off Lower California, and there transferred the cargo to the Maverick. Further confirmation is given to the story by the arrival in San Francisco of many Hindoo natives, expressing friendship for Germany, the presence here of a Hindoo revolutionist paper believed to have support of the Germans, and the warnings of the British Admiralty to merchantmen to beware of the Maverick. Lieutenant Ter Porren, aviator and officer in the Dutch East Indian army with headquarters in Batavia, arrived here today to close contracts for \$1,000,000 worth of rifles, machine guns, aeroplane motors and powder.

HOW GERMANY GETS HER FOOD SUPPLY

Enormous Quantities Sent Through Switzerland—Much Even From France? London, June 29.—Enormous quantities of foodstuffs are pouring into Germany through Switzerland, according to M. Jacques Dhur, a French expert in international law. It seems that a convention ratified between France and Switzerland on July 29, 1914, provides that in case of war, France shall supply the federal government of Switzerland with 800,000 tons of cereals a year.
