

#### RECENT DEATHS

**Mrs. J. V. Ellis.**  
In the passing of Mrs. Mary Caroline Ellis, widow of the Hon. John V. Ellis, Canadian senator and editor of the St. John Globe for many years, this city loses one who was long identified with movements having for their object the welfare of the community and the uplift of many persons residing here and elsewhere in the province. Mrs. Ellis died at her home, 219 Princess street, on Saturday evening, after a short illness. She was in the eighty-second year of her age.  
Mrs. Ellis was born in Fredericton, the daughter of the late S. W. Babbitt, of that city, but had resided in St. John nearly all her life. Long ago she became interested in community life and was a member and official of various organizations. She was past president of the Woman's Council, past president of the Natural History Society, Ladies' Auxiliary and organizer of the Band of Hope of St. John's Anglican church. The latter organization erected the fountain on Union street, West St. John. She was a former member of the board of the Home for Incubates and for years had been president of the Associated Charities and of the Victorian Order of Nurses' board. She retained membership on the latter two boards up to the time of her death and was actively identified with them until a short time ago. Outside of the various organizations, in which she was active for many years, she was responsible for many other good works, quietly but effectively accomplished.  
Mrs. Ellis is survived by seven sons and daughters, a brother and two sisters. Her distinguished husband passed away in 1913. The surviving children are Mrs. Margaret E. Lawrence, of St. John; Mrs. E. R. Taylor, of this city; Frank D. Ellis, editor of the St. John Globe; Dr. W. L. and George D. Ellis, also of this city; J. V. Ellis, Jr., editor of the Morning Herald of Yarmouth (N.S.), formerly connected with newspapers in St. John and Moncton, and Joseph N. Ellis, barrister, of Vancouver. The brother is D. Lee Babbitt, of Fredericton. Miss Isabel Babbitt, of Fredericton, and Mrs. George Lee, of St. John, who made her home with Mrs. Ellis, are the sisters.  
The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon with service at Trinity church at 2:30 o'clock.

**THE MONTCALM**  
Description of the Fine New Liner Now on Way to St. John.  
The Montcalm, the first of the three newly-completed Canadian Pacific steamships for the Liverpool-Canadian service sailed from Liverpool for St. John on Tuesday afternoon, January 17, on her first voyage. She will sail on the return trip from St. John to Liverpool on February 1, and will maintain a regular service between these ports until the latter part of April, when Montreal will become her port of call.  
On the final trial trip the Montcalm showed highly satisfactory results. A maximum speed of 17.96 knots was made without prearranging boilers or engines on twelve hours' trial her speed was over 17 knots on 12,000 h.p. The fuel consumed for all purposes, including the propellers, was 220 tons of coal per shaft h.p., with no appreciable vibration. The Montcalm presents a fine appearance and is admirably finished and equipped.  
The description of the Montcalm, which also served for her two sister ships, shows her to be a geared turbine steel steamship of over 16,000 tons, with two funnels 86 ft in length, 70 ft in breadth, 61 1/2 feet depth. The Montcalm and her sister ships are of the one-cabin type, made popular by the previous boats, the Melita, Minnesota and Metegana. There will be accommodation for not less than 220 passengers and 1,500 third-class passengers.  
The Montcalm will be one of the largest steamships in the Canadian transatlantic service, exceeding the Minnesota and the Metegana (12,500 tons), the Victorian (11,000 tons), and the Empress of Britain with her 15,887 tons. For comparison the Empress of Britain is more similar in type especially as both the Empress of Britain and the Montcalm are equipped to burn fuel oil.  
The Montcalm was built to all requirements of the highest class of Lloyd's Register, under special survey, classed A100-A1. Everything that can be accomplished to ensure safety and comfort has been given special attention, with the most modern systems of ventilating and heating, electrically operated mechanical appliances, electric steering control, wireless telegraph, Sperry gyro compass, and an emergency 30-ft. motor boat, in addition to the maximum requirement for lifeboats for passengers and crew.  
Spacious accommodation is provided amidships on B and C decks, the state-rooms being arranged for two and four passengers and furnished most comfortably. The cabin dining saloon extends the full breadth of the ship, and is arranged on the upper deck to ensure the least possible sense of motion, and will seat 500 persons. The lounge, writing-room and card room are on the promenade deck, and also the dining room, smoke room and children's room. A gymnasium is on a dark room for the convenience of photographers. The third-class passenger accommodation includes public rooms, lounges and smoke rooms forward and aft, with a large dining-room of three compartments on the upper deck, and an additional dining space on the shelter deck forward. The third-class cabins will appeal especially to the best type of British emigrant and to travellers desiring moderate price passage.

The fire spread so rapidly that Mr. Gallagher barely had time to escape with his five children who were in the house at the time. Mrs. Gallagher being absent in the city. Three of the children are at Mr. Tanley's house and one at the residence of Mr. McElliott, while Mr. and Mrs. Gallagher, with the fifth child, have taken apartments at the LaTour.
