Canadian flour mills for the first six months of the current crop year, ending February 28, 1921, cleared for export a total of 2,028,818 barrels.

Great Britain took delivery of no less than 1,412,892 barrels valued at \$13,059,474. United States, 608,224 barrels valued at \$9,248,400. While other countries took 1,286,772 barrels valued at \$15,346,997. This is a considerable increase over the record year 1913-14.

The British Columbia tobacco crop of 1920, grown on eighty-one acres, totalled 60,000 pounds. Most of the tobacco is still in the grower's hands. In 1919 the total crop of 93,000 pounds was sold to a Quebec manufacturer at 28c. per pound.

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BULLET CRASHES THROUGH WINDOW

A bullet yesterday morning entered one of the windows of the Modern Business College, corner of Mill and Union streets, and imbedded itself in one of the walls. IN PARLIAMENT

OTAWA, MAY 3.—(Canadian Press)

Yesterday in the Commons action was expected here about 7 o'clock tonight. Senate amendments to the bill respecting the Grand Trunk arbitration were approved with little discussion. These amendments provide for the head office and directors' meetings in Canada; a bill to amend the civil service act was up for second reading. Hon. A. K. MacLean, (Halifax), moved that it be given a six months' trial. This was defeated by 72 to 67. The bill was read a second time and referred to a special committee.

Akron, O., May 3.—Permission for Giuseppe Sarniola to keep two wives has been given by federal authorities and the Alaska Police.

Accompanied by wife No. 1 with a ten-year-old son and wife No. 2, leading a three-year-old boy and carrying a baby, Sarniola appeared at police headquarters.

He married No. 1 in Italy eleven years ago. Later he came to America. Four years ago he sent for her, but due to the war heard nothing and presumed she was dead. Then he met No. 2, a Pennsylvania widow.

Last week No. 1 and her son reached Akron on an immigrant train. Sarniola hastened to the police with his troubles, his wives and children.

After an investigation federal authorities told him to take his wives home and support them. The wives agreed to love each other and live peacefully together. They left police headquarters arm-in-arm.

"I love them both. They love each other. We all love. I keep them all. They say so," Sarniola said in broken English.
