WHAT COM. WIGMORE

DID IN SIX YEARS

Since Commissioner R. W. Wigmore took charge of the water and sewerage department six years ago, he has directed the expenditure of \$1,500,000, of which \$1,295,882.40 was provided by water revenue and the balance by proceeds of bond sales and city appropriations for sewerage maintenance and fire hydrants. The average yearly increase in revenue has been \$44,691; the average expenditure \$36,595 less and additions to the sinking funds \$61,892 more.

While \$70,000 of the money spent was the proceeds of bonds, only \$25,000 of this amount was authorized since he took office and, as \$25,000 bonds were retired by funds taken from current revenue, he has left the net bonded debt at the same figure as when he entered, in spite of the large amount of new work completed.

During Commissioner Wigmore's tenure of office 62,281 feet of water main have been laid as compared with 22,174 during the previous six years.

Last year the assessment was reduced from \$170,612 in 1917 to \$138,608, less ten per cent. cash discount, making a total decrease of \$32,010. The assessment was \$6,357 less than in 1911.

SOME RETALIATION FOR THE ILL TREATMENT OF OUR MEN

London, May 6.—In an address delivered at Newton, Lancashire, Lord Newton, assistant secretary of foreign affairs, after referring to those who were dissatisfied because German prisoners of war in England were not employed under the same brutal and severe conditions as British and other prisoners are in Germany, said his experience was that the best policy was to treat the prisoners well.

"It would, however," he said, "be idiotic not to retaliate when necessary and during the last few days retaliation has been put into operation at a certain German officers' camp in Great Britain."

SCARCITY OF FOOD

EVEN ON THE U-BOATS

Danish Sailor Claims to Have Been Prisoner on Submarine; Destroyer Attacked

Boston, Mass., May 5.—After an experience as a prisoner for two weeks on a German U-boat, during which time the submarine was attacked by destroyers with gunfire and depth bombs, Rudolf Petersen, a Danish sailor, reached this port today. Petersen said that he was on the Norwegian ship Storog, which was sunk by the U-60 off Kinsale, Ireland, early in March.

All the officers and crew, nineteen in number, were taken on the submarine, which was 300 feet long and said to be one of the largest turned out at Kiel. The Storog was then sunk by gunfire.

For two weeks the submarine kept on her hunting grounds, sinking many ships, Petersen said. Once they missed a deep-laden British transport by a narrow margin, but the next day they sank a freighter. The feat elated the Germans, and they tossed up their hats and shook hands all round.

"But I thought my last moment had come," Petersen said, "when in the English channel a British destroyer attacked us. These destroyers go so fast there is not any chance to torpedo them. This one dashed up and quickly began firing. Then we submerged. We could hear the puggles churning above our heads, and a moment later the submarine was shaken by a fearful explosion. It destroyed the fresh water tanks and did other damage."

Petersen declared the U-boat crew were half starved. He was served the same food as the crew, and this consisted of a thin bouillon with bread which he thought was made from sawdust and other nauseating ingredients.

The Storog crew were landed by the U-boat at Heligoland and were later released.
