NEW YEAR'S HONORS BRING MANY BILLS

Crowns and Robes With Necessary Fees Run Expense Into Thousands

(London Chronicle.)
Thousands of dollars are now being paid for the patents for the New Year's honours. The cost of a peerage varies, so far as fees and insignia are concerned, but a new peer would be fortunate if he escaped under \$2,500. Apart from the fees paid to the exchequer and the heralds' College, there are such things as coronets and robes to be considered. A coronet may never be needed, for it is worn only at a coronation. It costs from \$1,500 to \$2,000 or more. It is said that many used at the last two coronations were afterwards returned to their makers.

The robes are more often used, being required at state functions, such as the opening of parliament. They cost from \$500 to \$250.

Large Amounts Paid
The amount of the fees paid to Her Majesty's College depends upon the recipient of the honor. The cost of arms costs \$800, but there are other incidental costs such as quarters and supporters, which entail much research and considerable expenditure.

The fees payable by knights bachelors were abolished in 1904, and those in connection with the taking up of a title of nobility were fixed at \$300. It has been suggested that the recipients of an honor must be in possession of a certain sum of money, but this is incorrect. A new peer is not required to possess large estates, but no honor would be granted to one not in a position to support it. Many peerages have been declined because of the extra expenditure they would necessitate.

Clergymen Suffer Most
Still, no layman is ever mulcted in this way to such an extent as are clergymen when raised to the episcopal bench. Sir Henry Lucy relates that when Doctor Magee was made Archbishop of York in 1891 "he had to pay in fees an aggregate sum of close on \$250. There was the Crown Office whence issued the letters patent, the Home Office, which received it and charged accordingly; the Lord Great Chamberlain, whose emolument extracted \$10 from the archbishop on his way to take his seat; the Dean and Chapter, who got fees for everything and then charged twenty guineas for the bell-ringer and \$18 14s. 8d. for the choir."

Finally a sum of £28 was exacted on the hapless archbishop taking his seat in the House of Lords.

HOLDING BACK N. T. R. REPORT

While Tories Spread Their Version

AN EXPLANATION

I. C. R. Trains Cancelled Because of Lack of Rolling Stock—Hon. Col. Sam Makes The Money Fly

Ottawa, Feb. 16.—"Inasmuch as the members of this house, with the exception of the members of the government, have so far been deprived of the privilege of even seeing the report on the Transcontinental," commented Hon. George F. Gahan, when parliament met this afternoon, "may I ask when the government intends to make the report itself public?"

Premier Borden admitted that the request was "a reasonable one." He thought the report must be in the hands of the printer.

Hon. Frank Cochrane confessed that "I don't know myself." He promised, however, to find out and let Mr. Gahan know.

Keep Opposition in the Dark.
Meanwhile, however, the partisan version of the commission's report is being exploited by the government press throughout the country, and as yet not a liberal member of parliament has seen the report or knows anything of the details on which its conclusions were founded.

Hon. Mr. Haasen submitted to the house a copy of the convention agreed upon at the international conference on safety of life at sea held at London, England in January last. It deals with ship and lifeboat construction, an ice and derelict patrol, fires at sea, and the destruction of derelicts, and is to come into operation on July 1, 1915.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier asked if it would be enforced by legislation, and Mr. Haasen replied that he was consulting with the justice department on the matter.

Hon. Mr. Forster introduced the minister of finance's bill respecting trust companies. He stated that it was proposed to do for trust companies what had already been done by legislation for the banks and insurance companies and provide a uniformity of incorporation acts under a short model bill, following the model in use by the banking and commerce committee. It provided for compulsory audit and for complete returns each year to the minister of finance.

Hon. Mr. Haasen also introduced a government measure respecting the fisheries act. There were no important changes, he said, but the existing act, which had been unchanged since Confederation, in 1867, needed revision and consolidation.

In reply to a question from Mr. Emerson as to reasons for discontinuing the Ocean Liners, Hon. Frank Cochrane said that the train has been run last year throughout the winter at a very great loss. The traffic was not in the interest of the road to run the train.

Moreover, the I. C. R. was short of rolling stock, and if the Ocean Limited were continued throughout the winter, there would be no opportunity to clean up and put the cars in good condition for next year's traffic.

One train would be taken off between St. John and Hampton; one train between Point du Chene and Painesville; one train between Campbellton and St. Flavie; one train between Fredericton and Margville; and one train between Windsor Junction and Dartmouth.

Ottawa, Feb. 16.—In the house today, Colonel Hon. Sam Hughes replied to a series of questions by Mr. Proulx in regard to the expenditures by the department of militia for the officers' trip to Europe last summer, the special train used in connection with General Sir Ian Hamilton's inspection tour, the cost of the militia department's automobiles for the year, and in regard to the minister's private secretaries.

Colonel Hughes said that the party while in Europe last year had seven autos per day, rented at various rates. The autos were sent from England to Boulogne, and they were also used in connection with the manoeuvres in England. They were rented at a cost of \$6,904.

\$20,000 Trip Across Canada.
In regard to the special train provided for the inspection trip through Canada by the minister and General Sir Ian Hamilton last summer, Colonel Hughes said the cost of the train was \$10,000, and the total cost of the trip was \$20,740.

The horse which was provided for the use of General Ian Hamilton was sent as a gift to England to Sir Ian on Aug. 8 and was shipped after the receipt by the government of his report. The horse cost \$175 and it was placed "with all other costs on behalf of self and others."

During the year no additional automobiles were purchased by the militia department, but the cost of upkeep and repairs of those purchased in 1912 was \$8,644.

Colonel Hughes told Mr. Proulx that no order or regulation had been passed whereby no officer of the Canadian militia should be allowed to have a private secretary.

Colonel Sam's Secretaries.

From Cape to Cairo. All but 688 miles of the Cape-to-Cairo railway in Africa have now been laid, and in two years if present progress is continued this wonderful dream of the late Cecil Rhodes will have "come true" and travelers will be able to proceed uninterruptedly from Alexandria, on the Mediterranean, to Capetown, at the southern extremity of the "Dark Continent."

Great Britain proudly calls it her "All-Red Route." It will be the longest railway route on the globe, and it will continue to have that distinction until the proposed Pan-American line is built from Texas to Patagonia.

The All-Red route proper begins at Cairo. From there to Cape Town by the route is 6,944 miles. Counting the existing railway from Cairo to Alexandria, 180 miles, as a part of the route, the total distance is 7,124 miles. The continent of Africa is only about 4,600 miles long, but the Cape-to-Cairo railway does a good deal of winding about. Of the total route, 4,979 miles will be by rail and 1,946 miles by water.

The 688 mile link that is yet to be built will be all-rail at the Equator, from Stanleyville north to Mahagi.
