### STAY EAST, YOUNG MAN

(Sackville Post)  
Yesterday R. E. Acton, of Cookville,  
called at this office with seven fine  
Rose potatoes that weighed ten and  
a half pounds. They are the finest po-  
tatoes of the kind we have seen this year,  
clean, smooth and all suitable for the  
market.

Mr. Acton further stated that he had  
six acres of potatoes this year, and had  
already contracted for the sale of the  
greater part of them at over forty cents  
per bushel. He expects to have in the  
neighborhood of fifteen hundred bushels  
for sale. Mr. Acton, it is interesting to  
note, came to this part of the country  
from the west a couple of years ago.  
He farmed in Manitoba, and he is farm-  
ing here, and he declared without any  
hesitation yesterday that this is by far  
the best part of Canada for the poor  
man. Out west, he continued, a man  
starting farming must have at least two  
thousand dollars to lay out in the way  
of horses and farming utensils. Here it  
is altogether different. Several men can  
buy an expensive piece of machinery to-  
gether and the cost comes light on each  
individual. In addition to this is the  
fact that the east is a better country to  
live in. When we were in Manitoba, Mr.  
Acton remarked, we had to drive five  
miles to a church and three miles to a  
school.
