Managers of the Big Ball Teams
Of the sixteen major league baseball managers now preparing for another campaign, Clark Griffith has filled the greatest number of engagements. When Griffith decided to become a team manager, he took hold of the Chicago White Sox and won an American League pennant. He was shifted to the New York Americans and lost one pennant by a single game. When he left the Highlanders he assumed the herculean task of developing a winner in Cincinnati, with the result that he quit in disgust last fall and accepted his present berth with the Washingtons.
John McGraw of the Giants has filled several managerial positions. He branched out as a team leader when he was sold to the St. Louis National League Club, with which he remained for six disastrous seasons. He returned to Baltimore after that and took hold of the American League Club of that city. Finally, enough the Orioles under McGraw's direction finished far down in the race that year and when the little manager received an offer to handle the Giants, he jumped at the chance—the best move he ever made, writes Joe Vila. Connie Mack did not win championships until he managed the Pittsburghs a dozen years ago, for the reason that he did not enjoy absolute authority, but when he assumed the management of the Athletics things were different and he soon demonstrated his worth by developing several pennant-winners. Griffith, McGraw and Mack, therefore, are the only managers that have handled equal in both major leagues.

Mr. Trites' Horses
Bangor Commercial—A. W. Trites who has been in Bangor for the last week has a string of four horses which he has raced in the Nova Scotia races in the last two years with great success. One of the best ones he purchased was Leonard Wilton with a mark of 14 1/4, from the Gralam Stock farm, which he purchased of F. W. Ayer of this city two years ago. Mr. Trites had been saving him but last year entered him to take one of the big purses and marked him at the above time, which is said to be far from his limit. Ruddy Kip four and one-quarter is one of his fastest horses and has won four races. The sire of Leonard Wilton was Wilton, dam by one of the most prominent sons of George Wilkes, making his pedigree one of the best.

Co-operative Organization Finds London Depot Becomes an Essential
London, Feb. 19.—A central depot or clearing-house for eggs for Greater London has been opened by the National Poultry Organization Society, in Haverlane, West Smithfield, E.C. For about a dozen years the society, with which the Marchioness of Salisbury, is prominently connected, and which is a co-operative organization run by farmers in all parts of the country, has collected eggs from various districts and acted as a distributing agency between the farmers and the retailers. In the past the orders for the London area have been dealt with by the provincial depots and the eggs sent direct to the retailers, but with the increase of business this system has proved more and more unworkable, and the establishment of a London clearing-house was felt to be essential.
The society's supplies are drawn from about about eighteen counties, principally from Cornwall, Devonshire, Somersetshire, Dorsetshire, Hampshire, Oxfordshire, Hereford, Norfolk and North and South Wales. The system upon which the society works is based upon that which prevails in Denmark, and which has enabled the Danish traders to secure such a predominant position in the egg trade.
