DESIGNS FOR CITY'S TROPHY CONSIDERED BY CLUB EXECUTIVE

Question of Cup, Shield or Bronze Figure Debated—Local Skaters Warned to Get Entries in Before January 20.

THE advance sale of tags for the worlds skating championship meet here on January 26, 27 and 28, will open next week. It is expected that complete details in regard to this important matter will be announced on Tuesday morning by the officials.

FRANCE PREPARES FOR ROYAL VISIT

President Brushes up in British Etiquette and Polite Phrases

PARIS, Jan. 16.—Having been advised that a state visit from King George and Queen Mary is likely during the coming spring, Gaston Doumergue, president of the French Republic, is taking a strenuous course in etiquette and in English.

ENTRIES CLOSE JAN. 20

Local skaters who are planning on entering the meet are advised to get their entries in early as possible. All entries for the meet must be in the hands of the committee by Wednesday of next week, January 20, in order that the program may be made up. Local boys who neglect this will find it extremely difficult to get in as post-entrants and they are urged to see to this at once.

THUNDERBEG'S PLANS

Word was received here this morning from Lake Placid that Charlie Jewett, Lake Placid flash, and Clas Thunberg, Olympic champion, would compete in a series of races at Lake Placid and Saranac Lake on Feb. 13, 14, 15 and 16. The distances will be 200, 400, one-third of a mile, 800 yards, three-quarter mile, one and one-half miles and three miles. An invitation tournament also will be held. If this is correct, Thunberg has changed his plans about returning home. His original intention was to leave this side on Feb. 5.

SUPPORT URGED

Regarding the tag sale, a prominent citizen said this morning it was a matter of civic pride for every citizen to buy at least one of these tags and so aid in putting the meet over successfully. As expenses, running into many thousands of dollars, were being incurred to bring the world's championship meet to Saint John—the first to be held on the North American continent in many years—and the support of every citizen was necessary if the project was to be put over to the lasting credit of the city.

5 BANDITS TAKEN; THREE EXECUTED

Reward Offered For Ringleader of Mexican Band Which Held up Train

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 16.—Summary execution has been meted out to three of the bandits who last week massacred passengers, members of the train crew and soldier guards on a train running between Guadalajara and Mexico City. Five of the bandits were captured, but the lives of two were spared because they promised to divulge the location of the hide-out members of the band. Official announcement to this effect has been made by the government.

NOT GOING TO QUIT

Regina Member Denies He Plans Making Way For Vincent Massey

OTTAWA, Jan. 16.—F. N. Drake, Liberal member in the Federal House of Commons, denies all knowledge of the report from Prince Albert that he is going to resign to make way for Hon. Vincent Massey. To a Citizen representative he said: "So far as I know, I am still and will remain Liberal member for Regina."

Meets Daughter After 20 Years

LONDON, Jan. 16.—A mother and daughter, neither of whom had known of the other's existence for 20 years, have just met in a Lyons hospital. They were in beds in the same ward, and a letter for the elder was at first sent to the younger.

Russian Grand Duchess Is Repored Found Alive In Berlin

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 16.—The Social Democrats publishes a telegram from Berlin which says that "Frau Von Tschalkowsky" recently discovered in a Berlin sanatorium and claimed to be the daughter of the late Russian Empress, Grand Duchess Anastasia, who was killed in 1918.

MAN SAVED FROM MARKET SLIP

C. CREIGHTON RESCUE HERO IN MARKET SLIP

George Thomas Pulled Safely From Slush Covered Water

BOTH TO HOSPITAL

Rescuer, Unhurt, Proceeds to Home; Victim Suffering From Shock and Chill

GALLANTLY risking his life by jumping into the slush-covered waters of Market Slip, Clifford Creighton, 51 Richmond street, saved George H. Thomas, 214 street, from drowning about 11:20 o'clock this morning after a hard struggle.

GOES TO RESCUE

The tide was fairly high at the time. The cries of the man, who was unable to swim, attracted the attention of Mr. Creighton, a steamer, who without hesitation, quickly threw off his heavy coat and dove into the slip.

BOTH PULLED OUT

Meanwhile many citizens had been attracted to the scene and a rope was thrown toward the men which Creighton secured and finally succeeded in getting it wrapped around Thomas, who was then pulled close against the side of the wharf and his head and shoulders lifted clear. Another rope was lowered for Creighton who was able to assist the men in hauling to the top of the wharf. He was immediately rushed into the office of Andrew Malcolm and wrapped in warm blankets.

FIRST AID RENDERED

Police man Jan rendered first aid before the ambulance arrived. Both men were taken to the General Hospital, where after a brief examination it was found that Creighton apparently had escaped without serious effects and he was taken to his home. The victim of the accident, however, did not get off so easily and early this afternoon he was still suffering greatly from shock and chill.

FIRST ANTELOPE BABY

LONDON, Jan. 16.—The Zoo has had presented to it its first antelope baby. Two years ago, a male and female antelope were secured and the baby, the first of its kind in the country, has arrived. He is a beautiful sandy brown.

U. S. House Approves Italian Debt Pact

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 16.—Having approved a vote of 287 to 133 the Italian war debt settlement, the House turned today to five other debt arrangements with no expectation of opposition to them. The remaining debt settlements are those with Latvia, Estonia, Belgium, Rumania and Czechoslovakia.

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ITALY ASKED TO SET ASIDE SMALL AREA IN ROME

Neither Side, However, Has Made Tangible Proposal

POWER UNSOUGHT

Cardinal Bourne Avers Church Not Aspiring to Worldly Domination

ROME, Jan. 16.—In well-informed quarters it is said that the plan suggested by an anonymous Italian cardinal, whereby the Italian government should cede a portion of territory within the city of Rome to the Vatican so that the Pope would again assume temporal power over a papal state, and that such be effected through the League of Nations, offers an excellent solution, considering the closer relations already existing between the church and the Fascist government. Representatives both of the government and the Vatican, however, point out that neither side has gone so far as to make a tangible proposal.

LAW LIKELY REPEALED

This law gives the Pope a status equal to that of the King of Italy, and was intended to grant the papacy everything it could desire but the Vatican has never accepted it. The Pope preferring his voluntary imprisonment. Now, however, well informed circles consider it entirely possible that the Fascist government will repeal this law.
