REFUSE TO LEVY RATES, WILL GO TO JAIL FIRST

A Spirited Demonstration Against Certain Taxes in Poplar District of London.

London, Aug. 29.—(Canadian Press)—Labor leaders comprising a majority of the municipal council of Poplar, one of the boroughs of Metropolitan London, recently refused to levy certain rates and in a high court judgment delivered against them it was indicated that unless they recanted their decision they would be imprisoned.

Yesterday there was a great demonstration near the Tower of London in which all the east end boroughs participated in support of the Poplar members' decision not to levy the rates.

The huge procession was headed with a banner inscribed "Poplar councillors determined to go to prison to secure equalization of rates for the poorer boroughs."

Speakers urged the east end people to begin a huge no rent, no rates, no taxes strike. They said the movement would give labor the biggest victory ever won by the cause. The councillors re-announced that they would cheerfully go to prison and would cheerfully go to prison. It is expected that they will be re-arrested this week.

AMERICAN TRADE WITH THE TROPICS

A Remarkable Increase Since the Year 1914, Both in Exports and Imports.

Increasing popularity of United States manufacturers in the tropics is a striking characteristic of world trade development in recent years. The value of our exports to the tropics, according to the National City Bank, jumped from \$380,000,000 in the year before the war, to \$1,010,000,000 in the fiscal year just ended. Exports to the tropics in the 1914-1921 period increased 160 per cent. while those to the other parts of the world increased only 150 per cent. in the same period.

"This big gain in our exports to the tropics," adds the bank's statement, "is especially interesting in view of the fact that the bulk of the tropical imports consists of the class of goods which we especially desire to sell in the tropics, and that certain sections of the tropical world want limited quantities of meats and flour and coal, fully as much as the southern part of the United States and of the rest of the world."

"That this big increase has come to stay is evidenced by a close analysis of our official trade figures of the period 1914-1921. The tropical world consists, stated in very round terms, of North America south of the United States; all South America except Argentina and limited areas of Chile; the islands of the Pacific, Japan and Siberia (and in fact a part of China is sub-tropical); all of Oceania except New Zealand and the southern part of Australia and all of the continent of Africa. To the areas thus roughly outlined, while we sent in 1914 only 15 per cent. of our exports and in 1921 about 25 per cent. of the greatly increased total, we received in 1914 only 15 per cent. of the greatly increased total value of the merchandise sent to the tropics, and in 1921 we received 25 per cent. of the total value.

"On the import side the figures are equally striking. Our total imports from the tropical world, as above roughly outlined, grew from \$220,000,000 in 1914 to \$1,000,000,000 in 1921, an increase of 160 per cent. while our imports from the other parts of the world increased only 60 per cent. in the same period. Merchandise from the tropics formed 32 per cent. of our total imports in 1914 and 48 per cent. in 1921. The grand total of our trade with the tropics, including both imports from and exports to that area, in 1914-1921 period, while that with the non-tropical world increased but 110 per cent."

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WHAT SCHOOL BOOKS COST THE PUPILS

The advance in the price of school books is a practical demonstration to the public of the heavy expense which the provincial government incurred during the last two years in an endeavor to keep down the cost to the public. In 1920 the provincial government paid out about \$15,000 to equalize the cost of school books and the amount paid for the books by the public. In other words the government had to pay \$15,000 deficit for school books. This year the cost of books has increased and the government has arranged to sell the school books at cost price, exactly.

IMMIGRATION INTO CANADA

Improvement of 27 per cent Over the Year's Figures to April, 1920.

The August issue of Commerce Monthly, published by the National Bank of Commerce in New York, says that a recovery of immigration into Canada amounting to twenty-seven per cent. over the previous year occurred in the year ended March 30, 1921. Of a total of 148,000 immigrants 74,000 were British, 48,000 came from the United States and 26,000 from other countries.

Emigration from the United States to Canada increased steadily from 2,400 in 1917 to the high point of 139,000 in 1919. The flow was checked at the outbreak of the war by the prospect of conscription in the army and later by the increased prosperity of the United States. An even greater reduction followed the armistice and the present recovery is but a small advance toward the resumption of the pre-war movement. American immigrants are eminently desirable, not only because they are assimilated without difficulty, but because they are so much alike in the two countries, but because they are on the average wealthier than the settlers
