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Question by the Court

Q. What time did you discover the car was missing?  
A. Around 1030.

Re-Examination by the Prosecutor

Q. You said you got separate from Mr. Knox and you went one way and he went another. What did you do between the time you got into Brighton and when you got separated?  
A. We went in for a couple of beers.

Q. How did you find it again?  
A. I got in touch with the civil police and they said the M.P.s had it.

Q. How many beers did you have?  
A. About three small ones.

Q. What time did you arrive?  
A. It was around 900 o'clock.

Q. You went out to look for the car about 1030?  
A. Yes.

Q. How long were you in the pub?  
A. About an hour.

Q. You were in there from the time you arrived until you discovered the car gone?  
A. Yes.

Q. How long did it take you to drive to Brighton?  
A. About an hour.

Q. When did you leave to go to Brighton?  
A. About 1800 hours.

Q. That would get <sup>you</sup> in about 7.00 o'clock?  
A. No, it was around 9.00 when we got there.

Q. Do you know the accused Lieut. Knox?  
A. I identify him as such.

Q. Will you tell the Court what you know of Lieut. Knox with regard to the night of 3/4 Sep 42?  
A. At 0055 hrs 4 Sep 42 I found Lieut. Knox asleep in a shop doorway in London Road, Brighton.

Q. Is that a commercial street?  
A. Yes.

Q. What sort of a doorway is it?  
A. It is about 4 feet square and the entrance to a shoe shop.

Q. How was he when you found him?  
A. He was asleep in a bent position on the ground.

Q. How did you come to find him?  
A. He was in the doorway when I was making my tour of duty inspecting the shops.

Q. Then what did you do?  
A. I attempted to rouse him.

Q. Was he quite a heavy sleeper?  
A. Yes, it took about 15 minutes to rouse him.
