Q.148. Mr. Murray, will you identify yourself to the Court please?

A.148. I am Lieut. George H. Murray of A.14 C.I.T.C., Aldershot.

Q.149. During the month of December, 1943, Mr. Murray, you were rooming with whom?

A.149. I was rooming with Lieut. I. G. Wood sir.

Q.150. Do you remember the morning of the 17th December, 1943?

A.150. I do sir.

Q.151. What time did you get up the morning of the 17th December, 1943?

A.151. At approximately 7.20 sir.

Q.152. When you got up the morning of the 17th at 0720 hours you went into the washroom did you not?

A.152. I did sir.

Q.153. How long were you there?

A.153. I would say approximately twenty to twenty-five minutes.

Q.154. Did you see the accused, Pte. Lilley, in your room when you got up at 7.20?

A.154. Not at 7.20. I believe it was around 7.30.

Q.155. You saw him in the room at 7.30?

A.155. I believe I did, yes sir.

Q.156. What time did you go in to breakfast?

A.156. Approximately five to eight.

Q.157. Did you go in alone?

A.157. No sir, I went in with Lieut. Wood.

Q.158. What time did you return from breakfast?

A.158. Oh it would be around 8.10.
