SERIOUS ACCIDENT.

James Chisholm Crushed Beneath a Load of Brick and Badly Injured—His Plucky Conduct

James Chisholm, a teamster, who resides on Richmond street, and has several teams employed about the city, met with a very severe, if not serious, accident yesterday afternoon.

Several of his teams were hauling bricks from Lee's yard on the Red Head road and Mr. Chisholm was driving one of them. When about opposite the factory of the Fertilizer Co. he in some manner slipped from the load and fell between the horses and the sled.

The horses quickly stopped, but not before Mr. Chisholm was in a bad fix. Some of the drivers of the other teams ran immediately to his assistance. One of the boys was reviving him on his legs, while the bench of the sled was on his shoulders and head. Being unable to lift the sled Mr. Chisholm, with great presence of mind, directed the men as to the men as to the quickest way to remove the load. This done, he was immediately brought to the city and Dr. Lawin summoned. At present it is impossible to learn the full extent of Mr. Chisholm's injuries, but he is suffering considerably. He is a man of about seventy years of age and well known and favorably known about the city.

MORE CANDIDATES.
Another Laborer for Alderman—More Coming.

The labor people are elated over the success which has attended their efforts to secure a ticket composed of men from amongst themselves to run for the common council. They have every confidence in their ability to elect their men and will stand shoulder to shoulder in one solid labor vote.

By next Thursday night it is expected that the labor ticket will have swelled to five candidates. The name of the fifth candidate has not yet been given out. It is known, however, that he is a Carleton man, and if he comes he will run for alderman at large. Last night at a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council Chas. Jones, of the Teamsters' Union, was nominated to run for King's ward.

Ald. Hamm told the Star this morning that he is still in the field in Kings ward.

SPRING AT CHATHAM.
Last night it was very cold at Chatham, N. B., the thermometer registering four below zero as the lowest temperature. During the day, however, it has considerably moderated in this frosty little town and the last report from there said that it was 10 degrees above. In no other place in Eastern Canada was the temperature so cold within the last twenty-four hours.

The lowest temperature in the city today was 14 above and the highest 23 above.

POLICE COURT.

St. Patrick's Day Celebration Brought a Lot of Sore Heads Before the Cadi.

Michael Walsh, of the West Side, and well known as a speed skater, was before Police Magistrate Ritchie this morning charged with using profane language and assaulting Thomas Allan. The rumpus occurred in the ferry building on this side, and was continued on the western side of the harbor. Two witnesses were examined, and while it was shown that Allan struck the first blow, Walsh's conduct was the cause of the trouble. He was fined \$8 or thirty days for using profane language and \$20 or two months for committing a breach of the peace.

Wm. McCann, F. Rodgers, Stephen Walsh and Samuel Carson were in court this morning charged with committing a nuisance in Union Alley. They were fined \$5. His honor lectured the men severely. The fine was made to stand.

Some few days ago one Elkhelm came to town from Jacques River and was locked up, being found wandering about Lower Cove at an unreasonable hour. He said he was stopping at a hotel near the depot, and enquiry was made with the result that it was ascertained that he had left a small sum of money there. He was dismissed. Last night he was again arrested, and a charge of drunkenness, being proved against him he was this morning fined \$8 or 30 days in jail.

James Thompson is 64 years of age. On the 7th instance he went to jail for getting drunk. He got out yesterday, and it being St. Patrick's day, started in to celebrate. The result was that he got very drunk. He walked into a shoe store on Main street and made a lot of fun for the clerks, and finally started out with a pair of shoes under his arm. This was going a little too far, so James was given in charge. He was charged with being drunk and goes back to jail.

One other drunk was fined eight dollars.

Frank Devine is a sailor, and a great spender. It is because of his ability to part so rapidly with his money that he is now behind the bars. On Wednesday he was laid off at Eastport, receiving \$3. He came at once to this city via Calais, and when arrested last night had but one dollar and ninety cents and a watch and chain. He was remanded.

EXPRESS COMPANIES FIGHT.
Dominion Co. and Canadian Co., Roving Over Running Rights Over the I. C. R.

(Special to the Star.)
Ottawa, March 18.—A delegation of the Ontario fruit growers waited on the minister of railways yesterday and asked that the Dominion Express Co. be given running rights over the Intercolonial, so that they could profitably place their small fruits in the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Emmerson promised consideration. The application will be opposed by the Canadian Express Co., as interfering in its present rights. The Grand Trunk Railway influence will, it is understood, also oppose the application.
