DALHOUSIE PROFESSOR

GETS CARNEGIE PENSION

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 2.—The governors of Dalhousie University today retired James Leitch, professor of modern languages. He will receive a pension of \$1,200 from the Carnegie fund and in case of death his widow will get half that amount. They also appointed a successor, selecting H. P. Jones, Ph. D., professor of German and French languages and literature in Hobart College, Geneva, N. Y. Dr. Jones is a native of Nova Scotia, a graduate of King's College, Windsor, and took his Ph. D. with honors at Heidelberg.

The governors of Acadia College have offered the vacant presidency to Rev. O. C. S. Wallace, ex-chancellor of McMaster University, Toronto, but he has declined. So did Rev. Dr. Austin K. DeBelle, now president of a college in the United States, but the governors are bringing pressure on the latter to reconsider and accept.

The question of who is to be the next Lieut. Governor of New Brunswick is now being discussed by the politicians of New Brunswick. There are several names before the public, the being those of the Hon. L. P. Farris and Senator King.

Another name which is sometimes spoken of is ex-Governor McLellan. The leading Liberals of the province strongly favor the appointment of either Mr. King or Mr. Farris, both of whom, they claim, have been life-long Liberals and have always taken a most active part in politics, and have both done a great
