MOST AMAZING RECORD OF
AN INTERNATIONAL SHARPER

Pretended Duke of Otranto Has Been a Thief in all Countries,
Has Lived by His Wits, But is Now in a
Rather Tight Corner.

BERLIN, May 9.—In the stirring chronicles of causes celebre few more remarkable stories are to be found than that just unfolded in the little Bavarian town of Kempten, during divorce proceedings against Georges Monoleux, self-styled Duke of Otranto and Prince of Lahovary, most captivating and irresistible of lovers, most enterprising and energetic of adventures, most audacious, unshamed and unblushing of international thieves. This modern Casanova, to whom all hearts and jewel cases seemed to fly open at word was born in 1870, a Roumanian officer's family and was endowed by nature with quite extraordinary good looks, perfect form of figure, an inexhaustible fund of energy, a quick and retentive mind, and a brilliancy and a brightness which immediately won the confidence of every one with whom he came into contact, especially if they happened to be of the female sex. Fretting under the restraint he felt while a boy from the military academy at Galtz, and making his way to Constantinople speedily won the good graces of the first of his many victims, a high court official of the Sultan, who loaded him with many favors. There he repaid by the abduction of the chief beauty of his patron's harem, whom he carried off to Greece, together with a fat pocket book stuffed full of bank notes. Shortly after crossing the frontier, however, he was arrested and apparently charged at this check to his career he attempted to commit suicide. The handsome youth was fortunate enough to enlist the sympathy of Queen Olga, who had seen him while visiting the prison sick ward. Her majesty finally released him and gave him money to return to Roumania.

Once more feeling that his fatherland did not afford scope for his talents he shipped as freight on a steamer bound for Marseilles, and from that port literally stole his way to Paris. Commencing business in the French capital with modest shop-lifting he soon acquired enough capital to envelope his engaging personality in the finest and costliest of raiment which in turn enabled him to perpetrate a robbery from a diamond merchant that put him in a position to rent a large villa in a fashionable quarter, drive his own carriage in the Bois de Boulogne and back his own horses at Longchamp. He had many admirers, and these resulted in the Bank of England. At Chicago he is said to have won large sums of money at the American game of poker, and he only left the States when a millionaire, to whose daughter he had become engaged, began to make impatient inquiries as to his whereabouts. Back in London once more he initiated a system of hotel robberies which was expected to prove very profitable in the future. Though the first experiment was a failure, his plan was to enter a room on the first floor and if he found no one there to shut the door and clear out the valuables of the absent and negligent guest as rapidly as he could. If the apartment was occupied he apologized courteously for his mistake and withdrew. On this occasion the suspicions of an intelligent waiter led to his arrest. He was found in possession

of jewels to the extent of \$15,000 and was sentenced to eight months' hard labor. His next exploit was in Brussels where he struck up a friendship with a rich Brazilian whom he deceived into a lonely part of the town, where they were set upon by a gang of hired ruffians. His companion was held senseless to the ground and Monoleux, putting his assailants to flight, escorted the injured man back to the hotel. During the journey he took from the pocket of the victim a pocket-book containing \$7,500. Hastening to Monte Carlo disguised as the Duke of Otranto he there made the acquaintance of a wealthy Hungarian widow who purchased the fleeting semblance of his love for the sum of \$20,000. Monoleux, however, he rapidly gambled away at the tables. An hotel thief at Nice brought him \$5,000, but also eight months' imprisonment.

On regaining his liberty he set out for Italy, in the same compartment there travelled the plaintiff child divorcée suit, then Countess Angelica Wilding von Kongsbruck, a member of one of the most distinguished families of the nobility of Saxony who was going south for the winter in the interest of her health. She was accompanied by her mother and both ladies were charmed by the exuberant manners of this Roumanian estate owner as he represented himself to be. The three stayed at the same hotel, where a few days later Monoleux was then twenty-seven years of age, proposed to the Countess and was accepted. The wedding was celebrated by the Archbishop of Genoa in person and his witnesses were the Roumanian consul in that city, the Marquis Landi and the Duke of Roberto Berlingotti. This bride brought with her a large dowry which was exhausted to the last farthing on the honeymoon during which he returned to Paris for the exhibition where he had visited. He looked her in her room at night while he went in search of adventures.

In the following March the pair arrived in Switzerland where the child was born. But in the meantime the volatile husband had embarked with a liaison with another lady of going to Leipzig. The father he fought a duel at Leipzig. The family of the countess now assumed an unfriendly attitude and Monoleux suddenly disappeared. The next time his wife heard from him it was in a letter written from Frankfurt. In the interim he had visited America again and had stolen \$200,000 worth of jewelry in Philadelphia with which he returned to Paris for the exhibition where he made his first appearance as Prince Lahovary. Later he proceeded to Berlin where he won the heart of a rich American lady, his fellow guest at Hotel Bristol. When her relatives demanded guarantees that he was in a position to maintain her in a position to which she had been accustomed he walked up stairs and ransacked five bedrooms on the first floor. At the \$15,000 or \$20,000 which he collected in this way did not satisfy the requirements of the situation he went down to the Hotel Kaiserhof and repeating the same trick he had the good fortune to light upon brilliant to the value of \$25,000 in the apartments of a German nobleman. A man whom Monoleux procured to pawn the jewels was arrested, but the chief culprit succeeded in getting away in time. He was, however, betrayed by the many women who had participated in his rife affection and was run to earth in Genoa. Put on trial in Berlin this accomplished international thief was found guilty of every language that was of use in his international business and was never at a loss for an expedient played the fool so successfully that the medical experts declared him insane and he was interned in the criminal asylum in the suburb of Hietzing. There he behaved himself so well that he won the confidence of his warder. Then one night he attacked this unsuspecting guardian and leaving him bound and gagged,

AUSTRIA GOES IN FOR THE PRODUCTION OF RADIUM

A Special Laboratory Built in Which the Work will be Carried on

VIENNA, May 9—The Austrian ministry of agriculture has built a special laboratory at Jochimstahl in Bohemia where the production of radium will be carried on by the state. The pitch-blende found in the state mines will be treated and it is expected that a large profit will be made.

A local doctor has received permission from the ministry to use the water pumped from one of the mines for curative purposes, as it is found to be very rich in radium, and often very efficacious in cases of gout and rheumatism.
