BALFOUR DECLARES GOVERNMENT'S POLICY INDEFINITELY POSTPONES TARIFF REFORM

Budget Must Give Way to a Greater Movement if Britain is to Regain Her Premier Position in Industry and Commerce--A Great Meeting at Birmingham.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23--A London despatch to the Sun says that the Conservative leader, definitely threw down the tariff reform gauntlet in a great speech at Birmingham yesterday. The budget, he said, with its dangerous tendency toward slipshod communism, has raised the most important issue for many years and the nation had now to decide whether it would enter an upward, hopeful, forward movement of tariff reform, or take the first, though in nowise the last step on the downward track which leads to the bottomless confusion of socialist legislation.

PEARY HERE THIS MORNING; IS ALL THROUGH EXPLORING

Says He Will Never Again Go North--Twenty Three Years Enough for Any Man--Crowd Down to Meet Him

NEW YORK, Sept. 23--At an early hour today the list of known dead who perished in Terrebonne Parish during Monday's hurricane had swollen to more than forty and it is believed a score or more may be added to this number. Additional reports of death in other sections of Louisiana are also being received and the toll of human life exacted by the hurricane will come perhaps a hundred people when the final count has been made.

BOAT CREW'S TALE OF DANGER AND SUFFERING

Men from the Earl Gray Had a Hard Time on the Coast of Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 22--A tale of suffering and danger was related Wednesday by a crew of a boat which left the new Canadian Government vessel Earl Gray to obtain coal and stores on the bleak Newfoundland coast when the vessel's supply was nearly exhausted. While on her maiden trip from Barrow to Quebec the government vessel ran short of coal and provisions on this coast. A number of the crew manned a boat and rowed 15 miles to Bay De Verde, where they obtained two and one-half tons of coal in sacks and some provisions. After telegraphing to St. John's a report of their vessel's plight they started to return.

DISASTROUS RESULT OF ATTEMPT TO BREAK JAIL

Only One of Nineteen Russians Escaped; Nine Were Killed and Nine Wounded.

OSH, Asiatic Russia, Sept. 23--A group of nineteen prisoners attempted to escape from the local jail yesterday evening. While walking out for exercise they attacked their warders, wounding five and then made a break for liberty. The remaining warders summoned a military guard and together fired on the fleeing men. Nine were killed, nine others were wounded and one prisoner got away.

JURORS REGISTER A VIGOROUS KICK

Kendall Hall Leads the Attack on the Bluffers

The civil jury case of Peters vs. Barbour was not commenced in the Circuit Court this morning as scheduled, and instead of the lawyers addressing the court, His Honor Mr. Justice White heard a rather forcible address by Mr. Kendall Hall, one of the jurors. After the court opened at ten o'clock it was found that only five of the panel were present. These were the same five who served on the Lowell-Gray jury, and were accepted by both sides this morning without objection. Just as Mr. Hall was about to be sworn he registered a vigorous kick about having to serve on two consecutive juries. He claimed that there were men on the panel who were excused at a bluff, said Mr. Hall, and these very gentlemen sat in court listening to both the criminal and civil cases. He claimed that although these men were instantly cured when they left the court room as they were attending to their business, Mr. Hall said that these statements were not mere assertions but could be backed up. He claimed that although these men could be fined he thought a term of imprisonment would make them realize their duty. In conclusion he thought that it was not a fair deal that he and the other jurors present should be made to sacrifice their time because others deliberately disobeyed the summons to attend.

DISASTROUS RESULT OF ATTEMPT TO BREAK JAIL

TWO KILLED, SCORES HURT IN RIOTS AT BARCELONA

BARCELONA, Sept. 23--Riotous rioting at Castro resulted yesterday in the killing of two men and the wounding of fifty-six others. A religious procession with the local priest at its head was about to enter the church at Castro when it was attacked by an armed mob. The priest and another man were instantly killed and before the Goddards could restore order fifty-six persons had been wounded.
