resented at the Great Exhibition in London in
1862, and having authorised the Provincial Board
of Agriculture to receive, select and prepare such
articles as will best accomplish such object, the
Board invite the co-operation of all persons dis-
posed to become private exhibitors, and will take
charge of any articles coming within the follow-
ing conditions required by Her Majesty's Com-
missioners in charge of the London Exhibition,
viz:—every article produced or obtained by hu-
man industry, whether of raw material, machin-
ery, manufactures, or fine arts, will be admitted
to the Exhibition, with the exception of—
1st. Living Animals and Plants.
2nd. Fresh Vegetables and Animal Substances
liable to spoil by keeping.
3d. Detonating or dangerous substances.
Spirits or Alcohols, Oils, Acids, Corrosive Salts,
and substances of a higher inflammable nature will
not be admitted, unless sent in well secured ves-
sels.

All articles must be sent to George M'Leod,
Custom House, the Agent at St. John of the
Board appointed to receive them on or before the
15th January next, preparatory to being trans-
mitted to London by the Provincial Government.
