## KINGS GOVERNORS IN SESSION HERE

Canon Powell Delighted with Progress Made by University During Last Term—Many Improvements Made.

The half yearly meeting of the board of governors of Kings College, Windsor, N. S., was held in this city yesterday. There were present from Nova Scotia, Bishop Worrell, Rev. Canon Powell, president of the college, Rev. V. E. Harris, of Halifax; R. J. Wilson, of Halifax; B. D. Bent, of Amherst, and H. L. Jones of Weymouth, and from New Brunswick, Bishop Richardson; Venerable Archdeacon Forsythe, of Chatham; Rev. Seavell, of Sussex; Canon Smithers, of Fredericton; Rev. W. P. Dunham, of McAdam; Rev. G. F. Scovell, of this city; C. L. Hanington, of Dorchester; R. W. Hewson, of Moncton; and H. H. Pickett, of this city, governors.

Just a year ago the half yearly meeting was also held in this city. Usually the meetings are held either in Windsor or in Halifax.

President Powell made a magnificent address, the meeting showing that splendid work has been done in the past year, and mentioned the large number of students attending the college, taking it to such an extent that more room had to be provided, although a number of students were boarding at the present time in the town. He stated that the greatest interest was being manifested in every part of the Maritime Provinces on behalf of the university and that he was delighted with the large sum that had been raised towards the endowment in the past few months and fully expected that the full amount required would be raised within the time agreed upon.

Bishop Richardson and President Powell are to represent the college at a grand meeting which is to be held in London the coming spring, the object being the unification of university work in the Empire.

Since the last meeting of the governors a splendid new residence has been erected near the university for the president. He is now in residence there and his old quarters are used as students' rooms.

The collegiate school as well as the college and the girls' school, Edgemoor, is in a most flourishing condition and taxed to the full capacity. The ordinary route business was transacted and most of the governors left by the late evening trains for their homes and the others will go this morning.

## KINGS COUNTY EAST LOYAL ORANGE LODGE

The annual meeting of the County Lodge of Kings East was held at Oddfellows' Hall, Sussex, on February 6th, 1912, and was the most largely attended meeting of the County Lodge that has been held since the famous Baptist school question. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Bliss Freeze, C.M.; P. A. Chapman, D.C.M.; D. H. McNutt, Chap.; J. M. McIntyre, Rec. Sec.; W. S. D. Moore, Treas.; John Knox, D. of C.; Walter S. Neely, Lect.; Armour McFarlane, Abram Mabey, Dep. Lects.

The following resolution was unanimously passed: Moved by Brother David H. McNutt, seconded by Brother James H. Jeffries, and resolved:

"The members of the Kings East County Orange Lodge extend their sympathy to their Protestant Brethren in Ireland in their struggle against clerical domination and political chicanery."

"They further regret that the parliamentary leaders of the day in Canada are apparently under the same clerical domination, to which misfortune has been added the vicious influence of the anti-British Nationalist party; and they hereby ask their representatives to be factors in the subduing of this evil."

"Resolved to have a copy of this resolution published in the Orange Sentinel and the local press, and a copy sent to the Grand Secretary of British America for transmission to the Grand Lodge of Ireland."

"Dated at Sussex, N. B., the 6th day of February, 1912."

Two representatives from the County Lodge—the Master and Brother—James H. Jeffries, were selected to attend the Grand Lodge at St. John in March next.

## SWIFT GROUP WAS FAMILIAR WITH SYSTEM

Chicago, Feb. 8.—Testimony tending to show that the Swifts, Edward P. Swift, Charles H. Swift and Francis A. Fowler, described as the Swift group of defendants had personal knowledge of the test cost and margin system, which the government declares played an important part in the operation of the alleged combination in restraint of trade was given at the trial of the ten packers today.

Arthur P. Rogers, head of the account sales department of Swift and Company, said that the weekly summaries on the test cost and margins were sent by him to Louis F. Swift, Edwin F. Swift, Charles H. Swift and Francis A. Fowler.

Lawrence M. Lester, assistant manager of Swift & Company's dressed beef department, testified that he received his instructions from the four defendants who were officers of the company. He said he had all summaries of test costs, margins and shipments sent to the four defendants in the form of daily and weekly reports.
