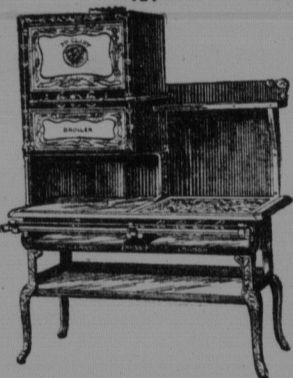

### TROUBLE LIKELY TO FOLLOW STRANDING OF THE EARL GREY

Capt. Brown's Certificate Suspended and Will Lose Position—Negligence on Part of Officers Cause.

Ottawa, May 2.—Wreck Commissioner Demers today gave judgment on the stranding of the government steamer Earl Grey near Pictou, N. S., last week. The certificate of Captain Brown is suspended for three months. Negligence is found in the case of Pilot Fraser and he is reported to the Pictou Pilot Commission.

Second Officer Gallant is found to be incompetent. The vessel was found guilty of a serious error of judgment in proceeding at full speed in the narrow channel. The speed statement that he ordered the speed checked was not borne out by the other evidence. Captain Brown will lose his position.

King's Bench Division.

In the Supreme Court King's Bench Division before Mr. Justice McKeown, hearing in the suits of Tilley vs. Lowell and Tilley vs. Bogies was postponed till Tuesday, Dr. L. A. Currie appeared for the defendant and G. H. V. Belyea for the plaintiff.

The non-jury civil case of Richmond Nochester, doing business as the New York Cordage Co., vs. Miles E. Agar was commenced before Mr. Justice McKeown, doing business as the New York Cordage Co., yesterday afternoon at two o'clock. This is an action brought by the plaintiff to recover a balance which he alleges is due him on rope sold to the defendant. The original claim was for \$2,242 and the defendant admitted liability to the extent of all but \$623. This latter amount they claim as a set off represented by goods sold to the plaintiff by Henderson Black of St. John's, P. Q., who assigned the claim to John Connor and who in turn assigned it to the defendant. The plaintiff must take the assignment subject to a breach of contract and the defendant claims that the assignment was made to the defendant John Connor and Henderson Black testified. The case will be resumed this morning at half past ten. Fred R. Taylor appears for the plaintiff and John B. M. Baxter, K. C., for the defendant.

### OBITUARY.

James Osborne.

Many friends in St. John and throughout New Brunswick will read with regret of the death of Wednesday, May 2, of James Osborne, general superintendent of the C. P. R. in British Columbia. Mr. Osborne, during the years he was chief of this division won the great will of all classes in the community, and his career since leaving here has been one of the leading men in the C. P. R. system and had successfully managed such important districts as St. John, Montreal, Toronto and the west. His career, which has been ended by his early death gave promise of even greater success in the future. He won his way by sheer merit. He was born at Montreal, September 19, 1861, and as a boy entered the Grand Trunk employ and steadily made his way. He entered the railway service in 1874, and served two years and ten months office clerk to the vice-president of the three years car accountant, and from 1880 to April, 1886, superintendent of car service; from 1887 to April, 1888, also in charge of the fuel department; from April, 1886 to April, 1889, assistant to the vice-president, and was then appointed general superintendent of the western division at Winnipeg. He came to St. John from the west in May, 1901, and in April, 1902, was transferred to Montreal, where he remained until November, 1904, when he went to Toronto to take charge of the division there, and in January last was sent west to Vancouver. He had thus completed a circuit of the whole C. P. R. system, having been in charge of every division except Lake Superior. No man ever came to St. John as the representative of a large corporation who entered more heartily into the hopes, aims and aspirations of the community, and no one ever worked harder for the general up-building of the city. Those who knew Mr. Osborne intimately knew a man of great amiability, of genial nature, and of much refined thought, and ever, as far as was in his power, did kind things. When news came that Mr. Osborne had been transferred from St. John there was general regret and the popular esteem in which he was held was made manifest by a banquet given him that was very largely attended. Mr. Osborne's death resulted from erysipelas with which he had suffered only two days. He was twice married. His first wife, who died after he left St. John, was a Montreal lady and was well known here. His second wife, who survives, is an English

### GOOD PROGRAMME HEARD IN SACKVILLE

Series of Graduating Recitals of Mount Allison Conservatory of Music was Opened Auspiciously.

Sackville, April 30.—The program given this evening in the Fawcett Memorial Hall by the Misses Laura Wilson, soprano, of St. Andrews, N. B., and Marie Fullerton, pianist, of Parrsboro N. S. afforded a very gratifying opening to the series of graduating recitals of the Mount Allison Conservatory of Music. The young ladies rendered their varied and difficult selections in a brilliant and effective manner.

Miss Fullerton who appeared first on the program, has the abundant and keen musical temperament which cannot fail to catch and interpret the thoughts of the great composers. Her most pleasing numbers were those by Bach, Beethoven and Schumann.

The vocalists, Miss Wilson, captivated her audience with her first number, that beautiful Aria "Eye Hath Not Seen," from the Holy City, by Gail. Equally effective were all of her other numbers, but special mention should be made of "Le Parlatte d'Amor," and the "Berceuse," from Jocelyn. This last item was accompanied by a violin obligato, which tended to round out the richness of the voice; and the harmonies of this song of surpassing beauty will long linger in the memories of those who had the pleasure of listening to it. Miss Wilson has a fine voice of splendid range and quality, her tone-coloring and technical skill called forth much admiration, and her dainty and gracious stage manner charmed her audience.
