PRESBYTERIANS' OFFERINGS OVER FOUR MILLIONS

Largest in History of the
Church in Canada Re-
port Indicates.

FORWARD MOVEMENT WELL RECEIVED

About \$237,000 Contributed
to Aid the Starving Chinese
People.

Toronto, June 1.—The grand total of the offerings of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, during 1920, for maintenance, equipment and extension, reached the sum of \$4,484,566, the highest figure in the history of the church in Canada.

This was the summary of the report presented by the treasurer, Rev. Robert Laird, D. D., for Western Canada, and Rev. Dr. Thomas Stewart, for Eastern Canada at the General Assembly which opened for business here today.

Forward Movement.

Forward movement thank offerings constituted the largest individual item in the list, making up this stupendous total. These amounted to \$2,619,176. The budget giving of congregations totalled \$1,665,536. Contributions to the Chinese famine fund made up \$237,504, and the amounts raised by the Women's Missionary Society to totalled more than \$400,000.

Requests to the church funds amounted to less than \$100,000.

The treasurers reported that the forward peace thank offering subscriptions amounted to \$5,272,000, of which \$2,729,000 had been paid in. The objective subscription for this fund was \$4,000,000.

Budget Giving Up.

The budget giving of congregations for the year showed an increase of \$13,304 over those of 1919, and of \$160,487 over those of 1918.

The total amount received for the maintenance of missionaries, educational and benevolent work was \$1,872,663, as compared with \$1,611,055 in 1919 and \$1,387,739 in 1918.

What is known as "budget giving" including congregational offerings and other receipts, amounted to \$1,872,663 as compared with \$1,152,710 in 1919, and \$1,005,436 in 1918.
