Patrick Boyle, Editor. Toronto, Aug. 1—(Special)— Patrick Boyle, editor and publisher of the Irish Canadian, and one of the oldest journal-ists in the country, was found dead in bed at home here today. He died of heart failure. Mr. Boyle founded the Irish Canadian in 1862. A few years ago the paper was amalgamated with the Catholic Register, but it was revived about a year ago by Mr. Boyle. He was 68 years of age and the recognized leader of the Irish Nationalist movements in Canada.
