Swept Away With Dam at Advocate Amherst

Amherst, N. S., March 28.—A very sad scene in connection with the terrific rain that swept over Cumberland last night was the drowning of Owen Spicer.

EXPECT MONCTON TO RAISE \$20,000 FOR MT. ALLISON FUND

Moncton, N. B., March 27.—A meeting was held here yesterday afternoon chiefly to form a committee for securing subscriptions to go towards the quarter of a million dollars being raised to place Mount Allison financially among the foremost educational institutions of Canada.

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WANTS TO COME FROM AUSTRALIA TO LIVE HERE

Immigration Office Gets Letter from Man in Perth—Quebec People Also Likely to Settle in New Brunswick.

The local immigration office continues to be in receipt of letters from many of the most enterprising of the immigrants with the taking up of land in New Brunswick. Yesterday from Perth, Australia, came a letter asking for information regarding the province.

The writer, who is a man of 40, with a family of four boys and four girls, had emigrated from England to Australia. He has been engaged in farming all his life, and his letter says that he went to Australia to take up sheep farming, but complains of inauspicious weather. The request for information specifies that in the reply the writer be informed in particular with regard to the supply of water in New Brunswick. Any New Brunswick is, according to the writer, the best watered part of the dominion, the superintendent had little difficulty in answering that part of the letter, he said. Full information was sent the man by Mr. Gledhill as to the possibilities here.

The province of Quebec was the home of the other applicants for information. Several old country farmers in the vicinity of Brownsville wish to come to this province if they can be properly suited with their own property. The superintendent is giving them particulars, and expects that the result will be an addition to the list of Canadian immigrants.

It was said Saturday that the Murphy farm on the Sand Cove road had been sold to a local syndicate composed of James D. Brown, J. B. Mahoney, and J. B. Mahoney, of this city. The property is a valuable one, containing about twelve acres. It has been owned by Daniel Murphy, of Fairville, the price paid to have been paid in the vicinity of \$12,000.

In response to the demands for land for building purposes, the city commissioners are taking the first steps towards opening up the area owned by the city in Lancaster for sale in building lots. Saturday it was decided to instruct the engineer to prepare a survey of the land which extends from the Manawagonish road to the Garry Settlement road, and to lay out two streets running parallel to these roads, and eight cross streets. The commissioners will wait until the plans are before them before settling their selling policy or price.

The three properties were sold by auctioneer J. F. Post. A lot of land, 440 feet on the harbor side of Douglas Avenue and 150 feet deep, was purchased by James G. Gannon for \$8,400.

The vacant lot, corner Sheffield and Wentworth streets, 40 by 100 feet, was purchased by C. E. Sandford for \$2,500.

The three-story tenement dwelling on Leesehold lot at the corner of Harrison and Hill-yard street was withdrawn at \$3,400; the two-tenement house on one of the adjoining lots on Harrison street was withdrawn at \$1,100 and there were 20 bids for the lease of another lot in the same block. The two-story wooden dwelling, 45 Camden street, was withdrawn at \$900.

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AMHERST HAS A TWELVE-YEAR-OLD BURGLAR?

Urchin Arrested Said to Have Confessed to Many Breaks About Town.

Amherst, N. S., March 27.—During the past two or three months several burglaries or stores in this town have been reported to the police. Early in February, the Hub Clothing store was entered by a rear window, the till raised and some miscellaneous goods stolen.

Joseph Aaron was the next victim, entered by a side window and a considerable quantity of goods were taken in a most unskillful manner and the cash register in the till was broken. The Hub Clothing store then had one of its front window panes smashed and gold which was stolen from a hole made in the glass.

A few weeks ago Hollis Crocker's store was entered by a side window and a considerable quantity of goods were taken. Other stores in the town, of the 5, 10 and 15 cent store, reported instances of missing goods and it almost looked as if there were an organized gang of burglars and thieves operating in the town.

The police, however, placed little Michael Perry, better known as "Mickey" under arrest today and it is reported that he has made a complete confession not only of the robberies mentioned, but also of numerous thefts. "Mickey" figured in the court last summer, but on account of his age was allowed to go on suspended sentence. He is a bright faced little urchin about 12 years of age. His case will come before the court tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Amherst, N. S., March 28.—It was hoped that the arrest of young Michael Perry yesterday would put an end to burglaries from which Amherst has been suffering, but evidently not.

Last night two of Amherst's stores in Victoria street were entered by thieves who made a haul of about \$30 and most goods were first burglarized. The office was ransacked and \$11 or \$12 taken. Mr. Carter was unable to tell whether or not any goods had been taken.

At the Amherst Poultry Company's several checks were left unguarded. The amount of money taken is about \$20.

Michael Perry, an eleven year old lad, charged with burglarizing Amherst stores, had his preliminary hearing this morning before Magistrate McKenna.
