Shipping News. Enchanted from the wharf of George Carroll, Esq., P. E. Island, on Thursday morning, 3d inst., a very handsome bark 600 tons register, built under the inspection of Lloyd's surveyor, and to class A 1, 7 years old. Lloyd's No. 1000 have been secured to make her staunch and strong a goodly vessel. She is owned by the Hon. John Yeo, and is intended for the foreign trade. -Sun, Journal.

The shad fishery this season is the best for many years past. A catch of 900 to 1000 shad in a night, on "one boat, being no unusual thing. One wiser man than well Cape this week took forty barrels of shad in a night. The shad are readily from the wicker at 40¢ per hundred. The weather has been exceedingly hot during the past few days. The crops are very promising, potatoes being heavily in bloom and the grass more than an average crop.

The Board of Trade Lunch. The Board of Trade lunch at the Victoria was, in fact, a dinner. It was appointed for 3, postponed till 4, still further postponed till 5, and was not set down to until nearly 6. The delay was caused by the determination to wait for the representatives of the National Board of Trade of the United States, who came by boat. Some of the guests hung round the Victoria with a very hungry look for a couple of hours, and others straitened around and boasted of their forethought in having eaten their noon lunch as usual.

The tables were covered with the best of everything in the market, and adorned in the artistic style for which the Victoria is famous, and the attendance was all that could be desired.

The guests attended strictly to business for the first hour, as all were hungry. The only late arrivals were Aldermen Melick and Lockhart, the others being on hand for some time.

After eating as if only hungry men eat at a good table the Chairman, C. H. Fairweather, Esq., President of the St. John Board of Trade, proposed the toasts of "The Queen," "The President of the United States," "The Governor General" and "The L. G. Governor of New Brunswick," all of which were drunk with much enthusiasm. Gen. Warner, U. S. Consul, responding in an apt and pleasing little speech for the President. Mr. Yeo, responding in a telegram from L. G. Gilley, expressing His Honor's regret at his inability to be present.

At the request of the Chairman Mr. Boyd proposed "The Dominion Board of Trade." He had, he said, prepared an elaborate speech in behalf of the ladies, and was taken by surprise in being called upon to propose this toast. Mr. Boyd referred to the Detroit Trade Convention to which he and the late Hon. Joseph Howe were delegates, and pleasantly traced the progress of trade negotiations down to the present. Then he turned upon the President of the Dominion Board, Mr. W. H. Howland, and described his boyish appearance when he came to New Brunswick and won the heart and hand of Miss Chipman of St. Stephen. And now, said he, Mr. Howland was the President of the Dominion Board of Trade, and with all the dignity of a father. (Tremendous cheering and laughter.) He could not agree with his political views, and hoped a reformation would be effected in them. Mr. Boyd then spoke of St. John's position as the fourth shipping port in the British Empire, and the late Minister, and whose great wealth he was too modest to undertake the task, and each of these gentlemen made brief and pleasing speeches appropriate to the occasion, calling forth cheers and laughter by patriotic and witty remarks.

Mr. Fairweather made a happy speech in proposing "The National Board of Trade of the United States," and Mr. Hersey, Mr. Smith of Milwaukee, and Mr. Nourse of Boston, responded, many of their remarks being cheered to the echo.

Mr. Howland proposed "Our Chairman in a complimentary speech. Mr. Fairweather is known and respected in every Province of the Dominion, and he hoped soon to see him take the seat that awaited him in Parliament.

Mr. Fairweather responded briefly and to the point. Mr. W. C. Watson proposed "The Ladies" in a humorous speech, and Capt. Dorr and Mr. Stevens of New York, responded.

After one or two volunteer toasts the party broke up, most of them going to hear Barnabee.

The Local Trials. The Government have partly backed down from their decision to take the case of the Hon. City Police Court. The Court had very little business to do this morning. Charles O'Brien, arrested drunk in Prince William street, was fined \$4. James H. Smith for the same offence in Germain street, must also pay \$4. Patrick Dollard has not been before the Court for some time, as he has been serving a term in the penitentiary. He was fined \$4 for drunkenness. Nicholas Murphy, drunk in Duke st., was fined \$4. James Gow for protection, was let go. Cornelius Sparrow was reported for encumbering Wentworth street with a quantity of lumber. It was not Mr. Sparrow who should have been reported, but the contractor who is building a house for him. Case dismissed.

Portland Affairs. The rocky hill, called Fort Howe, is to be removed. Mr. McGoarty is to do the work without any cost to the Town, he retaining the stone for building purposes. The idea was suggested and the arrangement made by Coun. Fellows, who were laughed at by some of his fellow councillors when the subject was first mooted. It is proposed to excavate the hill to the depth of seventy-five feet from the Police Station to High street. This will give a number of valuable building lots which will be a source of revenue to the Town. Work has been resumed on Main street which was stopped when the Council passed a motion refusing to allow any extra expenditure in the Ward. The Street Committee held a meeting last evening, and decided to allow an extra grant of \$700. This amount will build the retaining walls and lay the sidewalks. As the Street Committee consists of two-thirds of the Council their power when united is as great as the whole Board.
