#### ONEIDA.

In presenting the report of this part of the Muncey Mission, we have to acknowledge the goodness of Almighty God to us as a people, and to adore Him for all the way He hath led us these twenty-eight years, since we left the United States and sought a home on Canadian soil.

Your Missionary Society has always exercised a benevolent regard for our temporal and spiritual welfare. We have a good and substantial Church on the banks of the Thames, where we assemble regularly on the Lord's day for religious worship.

The congregation during the past year has been large, and the services interesting. We have three Classes, and when the Indians are at home they are regular in their attendance upon this important means of grace. Our sacramental services during the year have been seasons of great spiritual refreshing. Our Missionary Meeting last winter was well attended, and a great interest manifested in the extension of the cause of God.

During the year we held a Camp Meeting, which resulted in the awakening and conversion of many. We received into the Church on this part of the Mission fifteen on trial.

Our day school has been kept up regularly with increasing interest, and the opening of the Mount Elgin Institution during the past year, will, we have no doubt, give a fresh impetus to the educational interests of this and other sections of our Indian work; Members, 60.
