Angus Cady, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Cady of Dutton, died at the home of his brother, Dr. Charles Cady, Leamington, from the effects of a paralytic stroke.

A. S. Minelli, Plympton township, sowed a field of oats on March 30th, and thereby, it is believed, holds the record in this district for early spring seeding for 1921.

Further advances in the wholesale price of sugar may be expected in the near future, say the sugar dealers. No doubt an earlier canning season than usual is anticipated.

The St. John's Dramatic Club are putting on the play "No Trespassing" in the town hall on Monday evening, April 18th. This promises to be one of the best local hits of the season.

The remains of the late Mrs. Peter McKellar, who died in Michigan, were interred at Dutton last week. The deceased was a former resident of Crinan, where her husband died about 30 years ago.

Jim Johnston, a well-known bagpiper on the St. Clair branch of the M. C. R., is retiring to a chicken farm at Courtwright. He entered the employ of the railroad company 49 years ago as a brakeman.

Under the new schedule the officers taking the referendum vote will be paid as follows: Returning officer \$2 per poll, deputy returning officer \$2, poll clerks \$4. The payment for polling booths remains at \$10.

The referendum election provisions have made ample opportunity for polling the vote. The polls are to be open from eight o'clock in the morning until six at night. No excuse for anyone entitled to do so not voting.

A number of prominent farmers of Essex county met at St. Thomas last week and resolved to petition the minister of agriculture to have an experimental and demonstration station placed in the south-western part of Ontario.

Gregory of London, a commercial traveller who has spent much of his time in the West, will address the meeting, and Percy Quinton King, baritone, choir leader of Wellington Street Methodist church, London, will sing.

Mrs. Ellen McDonald, widow of the late Peter McDonald, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Margaret Daville, London, on Monday, in her 87th year. She is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Nellie Morton and Mrs. Daville of London, Mrs. F. C. Perkins of Aylmer and Mrs. Charles Lucas of Middlemiss, and two sons, John McDonald of London and Edward McDonald of Middlemiss.

The death occurred at Appin on Tuesday of Mrs. Hogg, widow of the late George Hogg of Ekfrid, aged 85 years. Mrs. Hogg leaves four daughters, Mrs. James Allan, Mrs. Samuel Lotan, Mrs. Wm. Gates and Mrs. Douglas Sinclair, all of Ekfrid township. The funeral will be held on Thursday from the home of her son-in-law, Samuel Lotan, in Ekfrid, at 1.30 o'clock to Oakland cemetery.

Richardson Bros. were the publishers and the change will result in George Richardson joining his family at Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, and R. F. Richardson joining the staff of the Ace. The Dispatch was established in 1861 and supported the Conservative party. It was always a creditably conducted local newspaper.

G. meeting, interesting and enjoyable papers on the life of the late Dr. George Leslie Mackay of Formosa were given by Misses Florence Keith and Frances Sutherland and R. D. McDonald. The musical numbers were a solo by Miss Minnie McAlpine and a piano and violin selection by Theodore Gray and Misses Hazel McAlpine and Eleanor Sutherland. John Strachan acted as chairman. A treat is in store for all who attend the Guild on April 15th, when Rev. Wm. Mackintosh of Napier is expected to address the young people.
