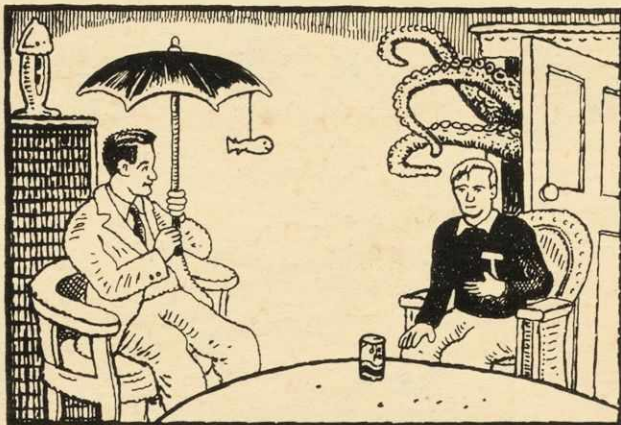

CFS committee lacked information

OTTAWA (CUP) — The Canadian Federation of Students almost passed a motion at its semi-annual general meeting last weekend calling on the federal government to reduce education funding by even more than it is already planning to.

The motion from the National Education Plan (NEP) committee asked the federal government to "make a minimum annual increase to educational Established Programmes Financing (EPF) transfers each fiscal year equal to the cost of living increase."

Currently, transfer rise 7.5 per cent a year. The government announced in September it would reduce the increases in transfers to five per cent a year for the next five years, starting in April '86.

The inflation rate between Sept. '84 and Sept. '85 was 4.1 per cent.

After a delegate noted that the motion would invite the government to reduce transfers more than it already does, the confused delegates voted against it by a margin of two to one.

"I'm certain (the motion resulted from) a complete lack of information on the part of the committee," CFS chair Barb Donaldson says.

The NEP committee also presented a motion calling on the government to make public EPF transfers to each province and the breakdown of the money going to health and education.

Due to an amendment to the EPF act last year, the government is already required by law to do this. Delegates defeated the motion.
