Sir Claude Macdonald, the late British ambassador to China is in Montreal, on his way to Japan.

Troops have been sent by the governor of Kentucky to quell the striking coal miners at Madisonville.

Lady Minto lost a bracelet valued at \$500 between government House and the Senate Chamber on Monday night.

A naval court of inquiry has found the grounding of H. M. S. Indefatigable was due to a gross error in judgment on the part of the pilot.

Nearly 200 machinists struck at the Kingston Locomotive Works because one of their number was discharged for refusing to work overtime.

The Belleville Electric Street Railway, two miles in length, was sold by auction under mortgage, and was purchased by Mayor Graham, for \$6,750.

During the inquiry into the loss of the Islander at Victoria, Mr. Green of Tacoma testified that Pilot Leblanc came on the vessel drunk, and Capt. Foote showed signs of having been drinking.

London, Sept. 24.—The Westminster Gazette to-day, says it understands that the three great iron-producing companies of Bilbao, Spain, have agreed to amalgamate on the lines of the United States Steel Corporation, with a capital of 75,000,000 pesetas, and an annual output of half a million tons. This trust will be by far the biggest thing of the kind in Spain.

SMUGGLING OF ARMS.

Lisbon, Sept. 25.—The British Ambassador has demanded that the Portuguese Government stop the smuggling of arms for the Boers through Lorenzo Marques, on the East African coast. The local papers denounce the demand as officious meddling by the British.

CAN READILY BE SUBMERGED.

Paris, Sept. 25.—The Petit Journal describes the 24 hours' trial at Cherbourg of the new submarine torpedo boat Sirene in the usual gloving terms. The paper says the new boat's chief quality is the rapidity with which she can be submerged. The time occupied is generally about five minutes.

TO BEAUTIFY BERLIN.

Berlin, Sept. 25.—Emperor William is having plans made for improvements of Unter den Linden by removing the mansions close to the celebrated Brandenburg Gate, and erecting a monument to the late Emperor Frederick in that vicinity. His Majesty expressed the hope that at some time he will be able to make Berlin the handsomest city in the world.

RACE RIOTING IN TEXAS.

Somerville, Texas, Sept. 24.—A race riot was started here last night, and several hundred shots were fired before the negroes broke and fled. One negro is dead, and two men are seriously wounded. W. D. Long was hit in the left side, and will probably die. Governor Sayers despatched troops from Breckenridge, fourteen miles from Somerville, and a large number of armed citizens accompanied them. The troops will search the woods for the rioters, and more trouble may ensue. The trouble arose over the employment of a negro brakeman by a railroad, the road paying no attention to warnings to discharge him. A train was fired on last night, with the result noted above, the trainmen and their sympathizers, returning the fire of the mob.

TIDINGS FROM THE POLE.

New York, Sept. 24.—Mr. William S. Champ, private secretary of Mr. Zeigler, who reached New York yesterday on the steamship Cymric, brings an account of the first stage of the Baldwin-Zeigler Polar expedition. Mr. Champ accompanied Mr. Baldwin in charge of the supply ship as far as Franz Josef Land, to assist in establishing headquarters of the expedition there. Everything was more favorable for the dash to the Pole than anticipated. Mr. Baldwin had taken a large number of them—420 of them—for the dash. Some of them are expected to serve as food for the men, as well as the other dogs. Mr. Champ intimated that there might be some trouble with Walter Wellman, who is conducting a Polar expedition over pretty near the same route.

MRS. MCKINLEY IMPROVING.

Canton, Ohio, Sept. 24.—There was little or no change this morning in Mrs. McKinley's condition. The weather was again favorable, bright and warm for the drive, and it was said that Mrs. McKinley would visit the cemetery during the forenoon and take a more extended trip in the afternoon.

SELL HER TO \$100,000.

New York, Sept. 24.—A special to the World from Boston says: Word reached Boston to-day that by the will of Nathaniel Hawthorne Cusack, who died in Washington, D.C., August 23, President Roosevelt's oldest daughter, Alice, who was much liked by Mr. Cusack, it is said, receives \$100,000 by the will.

Chicago, Sept. 24.—Officers of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union have decided to want a representative to the Philippines to do temperance work among the soldiers, and to collect evidence against the canten. Mrs. H. H. Paxton, of Ann Arbor, Mich., has been selected, and will stay two years.

TO COME EAST IN DECEMBER.

San Francisco, Sept. 24.—President Hays, of the Southern Pacific Company, according to the Examiner, will terminate his connection with that corporation in December after having held office for just one year. His family is already making preparations to return east at that time.

RUSSIAN GRAIN CROPS.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 25.—A report issued by the Minister of Finance (M. De Witte), shows that the winter grain crop in the southwestern provinces is excellent, and that it is above the medium in northern Caucasus, and Finland. The winter crop is only mediocre in Southern Russia, and in the Volga provinces. The spring grain crop is everywhere worse than winter crop on account of the drought.

THE GREAT DISMAL SWAMP.

A Region Strange and Interesting, Weird and Solitary.

The Great Dismal swamp is a region strange and interesting, weird and solitary. It occupies a billowy plain some 40 miles in length by 25 miles in breadth along the Atlantic seaboard, extending from Suffolk, Va., in a southerly direction, well into the bounds of North Carolina.

Its deep shades, great stretches of brake and its solitude make it a region of interest. To the naturalist and sportsman it has much to offer. In its silent fastnesses the black bear finds a home admirably adapted to his protection and in every way favorable to his increase.

Here amid the dense growth of underbrush and timber he may live in comparative safety, and there is perhaps no locality in the whole eastern United States of like extent which can offer a larger bear population than this great morass. The white tailed deer is also an abundant denizen of the swamp, frequenting the elevated parts.

In addition to the deer and bears, there is a big game feature of a rather unusual nature. The swamp abounds in wild cows. These animals, of a brown color and somewhat smaller than the ordinary cow, having for many years been under the peculiar conditions of the swamp, are extremely wild. They are ferreted from the herds of the farms adjacent to the swamp, and are the descendants of cattle which many years back wandered into the fastnesses and were lost to their owners, finally becoming wild. Being no longer recognized as property the sportsman may call game all that he may have the prowess to shoot.

Lake Drummond, some ten miles from Suffolk, Va., is the only great body of water in the swamp. It is a beautiful sheet of water, of an oval contour and fringed with a heavy growth of timber, mostly cypress, white cedar and black gum. Its water is of a dark color owing to the decaying vegetation of the surrounding country, but is suitable to drink, and possesses the quality of remaining pure and unaltered.

For this reason it is often carried to sea by sailors on long voyages. The characteristic mammalian fauna is of a semitropical nature as regards the smaller forms, while there are many tropical plants. Or birds there are not many kinds, prothonotary, hooded and Swainson's warblers and the Maryland yellowthroat being the principal smaller forms. The trees, some of which are primeval, are large and beautiful, while there is a luxuriant growth of ferns and aquatic plants. Cane grows in profusion.

CULINARY CAPERS.

A round of broiled Hamburg steak with a crisp slice of delicate bacon on top is delicious.

Stock intended for clear soup must be skinned as it boils and as long as the scum continues to rise.

A layer of sliced onions placed on the top of a roast of beef and allowed to cook there will give a delicate flavor to the meat, while their distinctive flavor will not be noticeable.

Mincing or stewed potatoes or any preparation of that sort should never be stirred with an iron spoon, as it is in many kitchens. A plated silver fork kept for the purpose or a wooden salad fork is much better.

Cream vegetable soups should be accompanied with squares of toasted bread; oyster and clam soups with pickles and crackers. Croquettes should be served with purees; with gumbo boiled rice is the accompaniment.

Caiflower should be placed head down in cold, salted water for 10 or 15 minutes before cooking, to draw out insects. In boiling, slightly salted water should be used, and the head should be placed downward in the kettle.

Plan For Single Beds.

Two in a bed is the usual custom of sleeping, in the United States at least, and also in Canada and England; but in Germany and France single beds are the rule. The latter plan is more healthful and comfortable. It is gradually coming into use in this country. Single beds involve more linen, more work in making and more washing, but I never knew a family to return to the old plan after once giving single beds a fair trial. Especially in a summer the single bed to be preferred, or even sleeping on the floor, to two in a bed. Many families declare they never knew what comfort was during the summer nights until they adopted the single beds. I might add a word of protest against allowing babies or young children to sleep with old people. The latter certainly draw upon the vitality of the former. This is probably true as between any bedfellows one of whom is sickly or less strong than the other. Consumption and other diseases have often been communicated from one bedfellow to another.

An Antidote to Poison Ivy.

In addition to the aids of the druggists' lotions, nature is said to have provided a most efficient remedy for poison ivy poisoning in the shape of the widely spread sower known as "spotted touchmenot," or Impatiens fulva. It is also called the "jewel weed" and is abundant in the water courses during June and July, when the Rhus toxicodendron and the Rhus venenata are most poisonous. The color of the flower of "spotted touchmenot" is a deep orange, and the spots are of a reddish brown. The lip forms a sack not much unlike the moccasin flower, and it ends in a curved spur. The seed pods burst if slightly touched and scatter the seeds all around. To this peculiar property the plant owes its common name. It is also called "roll me tangere" and "spotted touchmenot." The remedy is applied by expressing the juices of the plant and applying it to the skin which has been poisoned.

His Pass.
