

DALHOUSIE MILLS, ONT.—N. D. Morrison wants tenders by 15th inst. for improvements to St. Andrew's church.

BURK'S FALLS, ONT.—The contract for Presbyterian church has not yet been awarded, the tenders being unsatisfactory.

TROUT LAKE, B. C.—The Trout Lake Water Supply Co. has been organized here to construct a waterworks system.

FITZROY HARBOR, ONT.—Hemen Kedey, proprietor of the Grand View Hotel, proposes building an addition.

FINCH, ONT.—A by-law to raise \$20,000 to build bridges and pay off floating indebtedness was carried by the ratepayers last week.

ACTON, ONT.—T. T. Moore, Municipal Clerk, has invited tenders for construction of permanent stone roadways in the village.

BRANTFORD, ONT.—The Telephone Committee of the City Council have reported in favor of a system of municipal telephones.

STRATHCLAIR, MAN.—A new town hall will be built here, for which S. F. & W. A. Peters, architects, of Winnipeg, are taking tenders up to 15th inst.

BRYSON, QUE.—Marchand & Co., of Ottawa, have acquired an interest in the water power here and purpose developing it to supply light and power to the surrounding villages.

GRAND FORKS, B. C.—Preliminary surveys are being made for the proposed North Fork extension of the Kettle Valley Railway and the work of construction will be started early next spring.
