A gasoline explosion in the Williamson bakery on Saturday evening very nearly caused a serious fire. The gasoline engine was not working very well and in an endeavor to find what was thought to be a leak in the pipes, a match was lighted and ignition followed. The flames, however, were put out with flour and no serious damage resulted.

At a recent meeting of the threshermen of Yellow Grass district it was decided to charge for threshing, 8 cents for oats, 8 cents for wheat, and 16 cents a bushel for flax. When a cook car is provided, the charges for threshing are to be, oats 7 cents, wheat 9 1/2 cents and flax 18 cents. The threshers also decided to pay \$2 a day for team and \$2.50 a day for men.

Mr. John Billings, the first manager of the Bank of Hamilton in Moose Jaw, was in the city yesterday. He is now connected with the Dominion Oil Company. The company had thought of locating in Regina, but Mr. Billings says he sees better things for the company in this city, and it is altogether likely that they will open quarters here.—Moose Jaw News.
