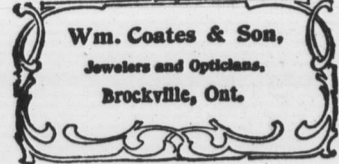

A judgment of considerable importance to dairymen has been handed out by Justice Arohibald, who found the C.P.R. liable for the breakage of cheese boxes while in their charge. The suit was brought by James Alexander of Montreal.  
Mr. Justice Clute has refused to quash the local option by-law passed by the township of Pittsburg, near Kingston. The point at issue was whether deputy returning officers and poll clerks are entitled to vote on local option by-laws. His Lordship holds that the regulations in this respect are as at municipal elections.  
In the Hotel Dieu, Kingston, a new anesthetic was used in an operation lasting an hour and a half upon an old man of seventy five. The area of the incision was injected with a new relief, neither ether, nor chloroform. The patient conversed with the doctors and nurses during the operation and showed no evidence of pain whatever.

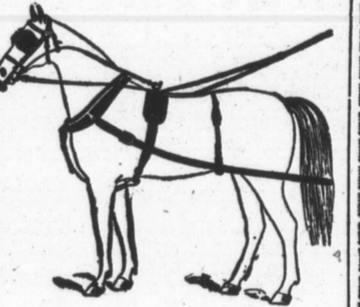
