SUBTERRANEAN STREAMS. San Francisco, July 15 .- A discovery of scientific interest and great commercial value has been made on the Island of Hawaii. Immense subterranean streams of the purest water have been discovered from fifteen hundred to two thousand feet above the sea level. This water will be flumed down to the sugar plantations at low-er elevations, affording an abundance for irrigation. From five subterran-ean streams tapped within the past few weeks the Olaa plantation has secured a continuous flow of 20,000,000 tions every 24 hours.

RARE COINS STOLEN. Milwaukee, July 15 .- Officials of the Milwaukee public museum report the theft from that institution of a large collection of rare coins, estimated in value at between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

PHOTOGRAPHIC EXPERIMENT. New York, July 13 .- Interesting experiments in photography by incandes-cent light were tried last evening in the Waldorf-Astoria. By forcing a current of 250 voits through lamps intended to sustain a voltage of only 80 a remarkably clear, white light was obtained. Plates were exposed, and the result was practically no different from Sunlight pictures.

HERE AND THERE

A writer in the Jacksonville Times-Union draws a pleasing picture of the conditions which prevail at Fernan-dina, Fla. He expresses the opinion that there are not half a dozen mortgages in the city. Almost everyone owns the house he lives in and almost every business man owns the house he does business in. There have been but three failures in 20 years, and the aggregate loss to creditors for all three was only about \$2,500. Many thou-sands of tons of phosphate and millions of feet of lumber are shipped anhually and there is evidence of general prosperity in this city, which is exedingly healthy, having a superb beach at hand, reached by bicycles in a few minutes, and fine roadways of

One of the novel business trades of London is that of a dealer in second hand plate glass. The large plates of this kind of glass are insured when put in a window, and when any of them is broken the owner of the injured glass usually prefers that the surance company should replace the broken plate rather than he should be paid its price. The dealer in the second-hand glass contrives to utilize what remains of the unbroken part of the glass, cutting it into panes of smaller size and disposing of them to various firms.

ROSCOE CONKLING.

The Career of an American Who if Living Now Would Be But Seventy Years Old. If Roscoe Conkling had lived until Oct. 30, '99, he would have been but seventy-the allotted age of man according to Scripture. The fact that he has been dead eleven years and a half and that for the seven preceding years he was a practising lawyer in New York city emphasizes the truth that he was a young man when public honors were heaped upon him. short he was only a boy when he was appointed District Attorney of Oneida county. He was admitted to the bar in the spring of 1850, when he was 20 years old. He was so big, even then, that nobody thought to inquire his age. Being a full-fledged attorney, he was sent to Albany to interview Hamilton Fish, then Governor of New York, in behalf of the Whig choice for District Attorney. The Governor was greatly taken with the dignified bearing of the boy; he knew his father the "Judge." So he cut the interview short and announced that he had an appointee for the office of District Attorney of Oneida county. "And who may he be"? asked Mr. Conkling. "Roscoe Conkling." was the surprising answer. Behold him then returning to Utica the the District Attorney of this countyand still but 20. Did he employ a lawyer? No. He jumped in, and conducted the prosecution of every criminal case on the court callendar of the remainder of the year 1850, alone and

Another thing that prevented Uticans from thinking of Conkling as a young man was his prematurely gray bair and beard. These, in connection with his great size, gave to him a venerable ppearance which his years did not tify. James Russell Lowell tells a occasion in 1852 several of the Whigs of Boston had assembled he purpose of considering the dis-en of the Whig party. To them Daniel Webster, who, raising to ull beight, spake from the caverndepths of his great chest the fcling lugubrious words: "Discontinue vaig party! But to where would Then Mr. Lowell adds: "If he been a little fellow, five feet two, should have answered him. Who e devil cares where you go!" But he oxed so imposing when he spoke that at we were all frightened at our merity in purposing to dissolve the ick death left us at liverty to break Whiggery in Massachusetts."
