As both the North and South Poles have been discovered, perhaps some kind explorer would make an effort to locate the whereabouts of spring.

Sunday last, April 7th, was the forty-fourth anniversary of the death of Thomas D'Arcy McGee, to whose memory a monument is to be erected at Ottawa by the Canadian Government.

Premier Borden and Mrs. Borden will spend a couple of weeks vacation at hot springs. The Premier is looking well and happy. The prophets, political, are the only ones who look sick these days, and they will look even sicker a little later on.

The work on the new government building has been resumed. Through energetic action of our young representative arrangements have been made for including a clock and tower which was omitted from the original plan. The change will be a great improvement.

Rhodes, Curry & Co. have been awarded the contract for the erection of the new Manual Training Building and will begin work as soon as weather conditions permit. The building will be about the size of the Carnegie Science Hall and similar in appearance to it. It will be two stories high and built of brick with stone trimming. The exact location has not yet been decided upon. This building is to be erected in memory of the late N. A. Rhodes, who was for many years an active member of the Board of Governors of Acadia University, and will be presented complete by Mrs. Rhodes.

Among the new members of the P. E. Island legislature this year is Professor Alexander McPhail, of Queen's University, Kingston, who is sitting for the Fourth District of Queens, in which Orwell, his old home, is located. The professor, in his maiden speech, made a strong appeal for the revival of the once flourishing industries of his province, of weaving both woolen and cotton goods, carding wool, tanning, carriage manufacturing and others. He wears in the House, as an object lesson to the members, a very becoming grey homespun suit, made of cloth woven in his native district.

The Monetary Times estimate of Canada's fire loss during March amounted to \$2,671,414, compared with February's loss of \$1,629,165, and \$832,350 for the corresponding period last year. Of the presumed causes, eight were attributed to overheated furnaces or boilers, one to a defective chimney, three to heating pipes, two to defective, two to spontaneous combustion, two to defective wiring, two engine sparks, one each from chemical action from slacking lime, three dynamite igniting, pile hot ashes, ash bin. The number of deaths from fires is twenty-four, making sixty-two for the three months of 1912.

To-night at 7:30 John V. Payzant, D. C. L., of Halifax, will deliver an address in College Hall on the late Judge James W. Johnson. Mr. Payzant is a graduate of Acadia, of the class of 1860, and the address which he will present is the same as that delivered before the N. S. Historical Society which has started an agitation for the erection of a statue of Judge Johnson near that of his life rival, Joseph Howe. The government has the matter under consideration now. The main floor of College Hall will be reserved for the students, but the galleries will be open to the public and all are cordially invited to be present. No admission will be charged.

The decision of the British Miners' Federation to order the men to resume work has brought intense relief to the whole country. The termination of the coal strike virtually amounts to raising a rain-storm of the nation's industries, which has inflicted financial loss far larger than would have been caused by a war with a great power, of similar duration. In Scotland the miners were to have returned to the collieries on Monday but as that day was a holiday in England and Wales the strikers there did not return to the coal fields until Tuesday. In many of the mines two or three days more will elapse before repairs can be completed. By the end of the week, however, it is expected that every colliery will be in full swing.

You Cannot Get It, Then Let Us Have It.

Mr. B. L. Bishop's letter, in our last issue, with the above heading, did not give enough explanation. However, it lets us all know where we stand in regard to the proposed aboiteau across the Cornwallis river.

He admits that on some counts the Town Plot site for the aboiteau is better than that at Fort Williams. Will he not admit that it is better on every count? He says that Wolfville is friendless in regard to the question. As it is not a question of Wolfville against the country, but rather, the country including Wolfville against Fort Williams, we cannot believe that all this large interest is 'friendless.' Certainly not, when the larger advantages growing out of the Town Plot aboiteau are considered.

How much of the country must come under the ban of the opposition he speaks of is known by Mr. B. so he cannot ignore it by stating the case as Wolfville versus Fort Williams. We are within our rights, then, in our agitation for recognition of the country's claim for an aboiteau placed where it will serve the largest and best interests.

The Government as well as the people generally know of the superiority of the Town Plot or Wolfville site. Premier Murray spoke in its favor when met by the large and representative delegation last year. A committee was appointed to go ahead and get the matter into shape. An engineer was to be sent to get full information as to a suitable crossing place.

Having gone so far we are to infer that we are all to be ignored by the Government when an aboiteau bill comes up before the House? Too much has been said, and the benefits to be known to be set aside now. Unless we in concert ask that the idea of the Wolfville-Town Plot aboiteau be abandoned, it is not to be expected that our claims will be forgotten.

The delegation that met with the Government last year asked for an aboiteau on the Cornwallis river. To the question, where the merits of both sites were fully discussed, and we believe the lower one carried the day. At this late day, after a bill has been prepared and all arrangements made to have the aboiteau built at Fort Williams, Mr. B. informs the public that the Provincial engineer's plans are completed. Does the engineer state or does Mr. B. state that the aboiteau is 'practically' out of the question at Town Plot, because of the cost? If so, upon whose authority? And why an indefinite statement? What is the estimated cost? We have been waiting for three years or more for the estimated cost of this aboiteau. At this late day we are asked to give up all hope of it here. And Mr. Bishop is blaming us for still asking for it because there must be an aboiteau on the river, forty years ago. It is a late day to learn that we are 'without a shadow of hope for success' and that agitates again for the lower site our efforts 'will be once more come to naught.' We united with the delegation last year in good faith and agreed upon a definite course. Out of this action grew the proposal to get to work and have the aboiteau at Wolfville and Town Plot (not for this town alone but for the country). A Provincial and a Dominion engineer surveyed the river. Upon all this Mr. Bishop says, "You cannot get it. Then let us have it."

If the particular site where soundings were made presents difficulties, other crossings should be tested until the right place is found. All must admit that not to put the aboiteau in the very best place for the largest interests connected with a serious mistake. Such a blunder we cannot but warn the people of the country to avoid. This we feel to be our duty.

The lower aboiteau will do all and a great deal more than the upper one can ever do. It will make a harbor that will remain open. This cannot be said of the upper site. It will supply a bridge so much needed in addition to the other benefits. Port Williams has its crossing place now. Land protection is ensured to a vastly greater extent here than above. As an example the Wickwire dike has lost through the action of tidal water: 100 acres dike \$500,000 \$10,000
100 acres marsh \$50 3,000
Hay and grain 50 years at 6,000
Depreciation 500 acres 50 per cent 10,600
Rate and other losses 7,000
\$39,600

This loss in less degree is going on along the river, and will soon use up all an aboiteau is built at some point near Town Plot. Are we not within our rights in asking that this terrible loss be stopped?


