

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS TO HEAR FINE ADDRESSES

At Religious Education Council Convention, Brandon, November 24, 25, 26

The first convention of the Religious Education Council of Manitoba will be held in the First Methodist Church on November 24th, 25th and 26th. This is really the fortieth annual Sunday School Convention in Manitoba, but the name has now been changed as above. Sunday School workers from all over the Province will be present at this important convention and some of the leaders in Sunday School work will be present and give interesting talks on problems which face the Sunday School of today.

The Wednesday afternoon program will be featured by an address from the Rev. Basil W. Thompson, M.A., of Winnipeg who will speak on "Christianity, the hope of the World." The address of the evening will be given Mrs. J. R. Hamilton who will take as her subject the "Importance of Elementary Work" while the Rev. J. R. Little will speak on "Religion in the Home."

Thursday morning discussions will be led by Dr. A. W. McIntyre and A. White. "The appeal of Childhood" will be the subject for an address at the Thursday afternoon session by Prof. A. E. Hetherington, while sectional conferences will be led by Mrs. J. R. Hamilton, Messrs. H. Stewart, D. R. Poole, Miss O. I. Ziegler and Miss M. E. Macdonald. Two addresses, one on Boys Work by Dr. R. Poole, and the other on Girls Work by Miss Ziegler, will have a place on the evening program.

The Rural School and the City School will be subjects spoken to by Rev. T. W. Price and Mr. E. G. Williams, while Mr. F. A. Wood will speak on the task of financing the Sunday School locally, and Mr. G. H. Stewart will give a talk on Religious Education Council at the morning session on Friday. In the afternoon an address entitled "Follow Me" will be given by Rev. Hugh Kilgour, while sectional conferences will be addressed by Miss Hattie Knight, Prof. A. E. Hetherington, Rev. W. C. Smalley. The convention's closing address will come from Rev. F. W. Kerr who will speak on "Religion and the National Life."

Henry J. Rositter, D.C.M.

After an illness of about two months the death occurred on Sunday in Brandon of Mr. Henry J. Rositter, D.C.M., aged twenty-seven years, formerly of Dorset, England. Prior to his illness the late Mr. Rositter had been in Canada about six weeks and was employed by Mr. H. Smith at Oak Lake. GERMANY DELIVERS BONDS AS SPECIFIED IN THE PEACE TREATY

London, Nov. 10.—Germany has delivered to the Reparations Commission bonds to the amount of \$9,000,000 gold marks, the value of which is approximately \$3,000,000,000 at the present rate of exchange. This announcement was made in the House of Commons Tuesday by Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer. The delivery of the bonds is in accordance with the requirements of the Peace Treaty and the Commission proposes to hold them as security for and in acknowledgment of Germany's debt.

REFERENDUM COST DOMINION ABOUT \$750,000

Cost of Voting in 1917 Was \$500,000—Estimate 25 Per Cent Increase

Ottawa, Nov. 10.—(By Canadian Press).—Judging by the cost of conducting the election in 1917 the cost of the recent plebiscite on liquor importation, taken in the four provinces simultaneously, will be in the neighborhood of \$750,000. The provinces voting on the same day, were Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Nova Scotia. Copies of the Auditor-General's report covering the cost of the election held in 1917 show the average cost per polling district in each of these provinces to be roughly as follows:

Alberta, \$12,000 to \$15,000; Saskatchewan, \$10,000; Manitoba, \$6,000, and Nova Scotia, \$4,000. In several of the districts in 1917 there were acclamations, but the above figures represent fair averages for the divisions in which the polling took place.

The districts in which there was voting under the Canada Temperance Act last month numbered 57. Of these there were 12 in Alberta, 16 in Saskatchewan, 15 in Manitoba and 14 in Nova Scotia.

This would bring the cost of the 1917 election, had all the provinces voted, to roughly \$500,000 had there been voting in all districts. The cost of conducting an election, it is estimated, has increased by about 25 per cent since that time. Increases have been made in the tariff of fees in several instances. In some cases the fees are the same, but the mileage allowance has been increased, and in that way it is estimated that the cost of the recent plebiscite would be one-quarter higher than the cost in the same provinces in 1917.

9,000 TORONTO MEN ARE NOW OUT OF EMPLOYMENT

Two Thousand of Them Could Be Placed But They Won't Go to Woods

Toronto, Nov. 10.—"It is practically certain that at least 9,000 men are at present looking for work in this city," said Rev. F. A. Miller, Superintendent of the Provincial Employment Bureau here, yesterday. He stated that he could place 2,000 men at once if they were willing to go to the woods.

12,000 BALTIMORE MEN NOT TAKING WAGE INCREASE

Granted Under Agreement Signed One Year Ago—Satisfied With Present Pay

Baltimore, Nov. 10.—Twelve thousand workmen, members of building trades in Baltimore, have declined to accept an increase in wages. The agreement signed one year ago granted them an increase to take effect November 1 of this year. Some of the men say that, as prices are falling and there are indications of steady work at the present wage, they are satisfied.

RICH DEPOSITS OF NICKEL COPPER ORE BEAR RIVER DISTRICT

Winnipeg, Nov. 10.—Rich deposits of nickel copper ore were uncovered recently at Bear River by Dr. J. E. Wilkinson, he announces. He returned from the district Saturday.

The deposit is of Nickel, copper ore and Dr. Wilkinson says the ore occurs in nodules, exactly similar to the Sudbury nodule. The deposit uncovered is 800 feet long and from 100 to 400 feet wide. The ore contains good values in platinum and gold, Dr. Wilkinson said. He was accompanied on the trip by Jack McDonald and John Hanson, experienced miners.

MONTREAL SUGAR MAKERS MAY GET TOGETHER

Ending Price Cutting—Sugar Sells for 14c Pound in Toronto

Montreal, Nov. 10.—The war in the sugar camp in this city has been considerably modified and peace appears to be in sight. The largest sugar wholesalers state that few retailers have availed themselves of the opportunity offered for buying sugar below market prices and at least two cents lower than the cost warranted by New York prices, combined with duty, freight and exchange. It is estimated that the bottom has been reached and that the time is fast approaching when the price will rise.

No word so far has come from the "big four" refiners. The preponderance is still at 13c flat to wholesalers, though the Atlantic sugar refiners are reported today to be quoting 13.50, less the usual five per cent, for wholesalers. The lowest price is still that of the Dominion Sugar Company at a straight 13c, less five per cent. Reports that sales had been made at 12c could not be confirmed.

A few retailers are selling at cost, 13c, but the majority at 14, 15 and some at 16c.

14 Cents, Toronto.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—Sugar was selling at 14 cents in some of the retail stores here Tuesday. In wholesale circles further declines were expected.

New Low For New York

New York, Nov. 10.—Raw sugar dropped to 6 1/2 cents a pound, a new low for the season, in the sugar market here. The price reflected heavy slack in demand, and is a loss of more than 17 cents from the highest in the season's quotations, last May. Trading was dull.

BRITISH FLAG TORN DOWN FOR THE SECOND TIME

New York Theatre Will Sew It With Other Allied Flags and Hoist it Again

New York, Nov. 10.—For the second time in a week a British flag in front of the Capitol Theatre here, decorated for Armistice Week, has been torn pulled the flag down and burned it. The theatre management say they will put a new flag up and sew it together with other Allied flags so that marauders will have to destroy all or none.

FARMER MUST HAVE FAIR PAY FOR HIS LABORS

Establishment of Nation-wide Selling Agencies Predicted in the U. S.

Boston, Nov. 10.—The establishment of nation-wide organizations which shall fix the price of farm products, if the farmer does not receive "the same pay for the same hours of work that others receive," is predicted today by Sherman J. Lowell, Fredonia, N.Y., Master of the National Grange of Patrons of Husbandry, at the opening of the annual convention of the Grange.

"There is no threat in this, we will have been driven to it in self-defence to preserve our agriculture," he said.

MOTOR CAR PARTLY BURNED

A small fire which caused some excitement in the Alexander district occurred Tuesday evening on the farm of Mr. H. S. Nichol. Mr. Earl White was filling the gasoline tank of his motor car, when evidently some of the gasoline splashed on the lantern which immediately caught fire and before it could be extinguished part of the top of the motor had been burned.

RUG PRICES DOWN

New York, Nov. 10.—Price reductions ranging from 25 to 30 per cent. for October figures were noted at the opening of a sale here of 45,000 bales of rugs and carpets, valued at several million dollars. Bidding was active from the start, and the first day's sales were considered excellent.

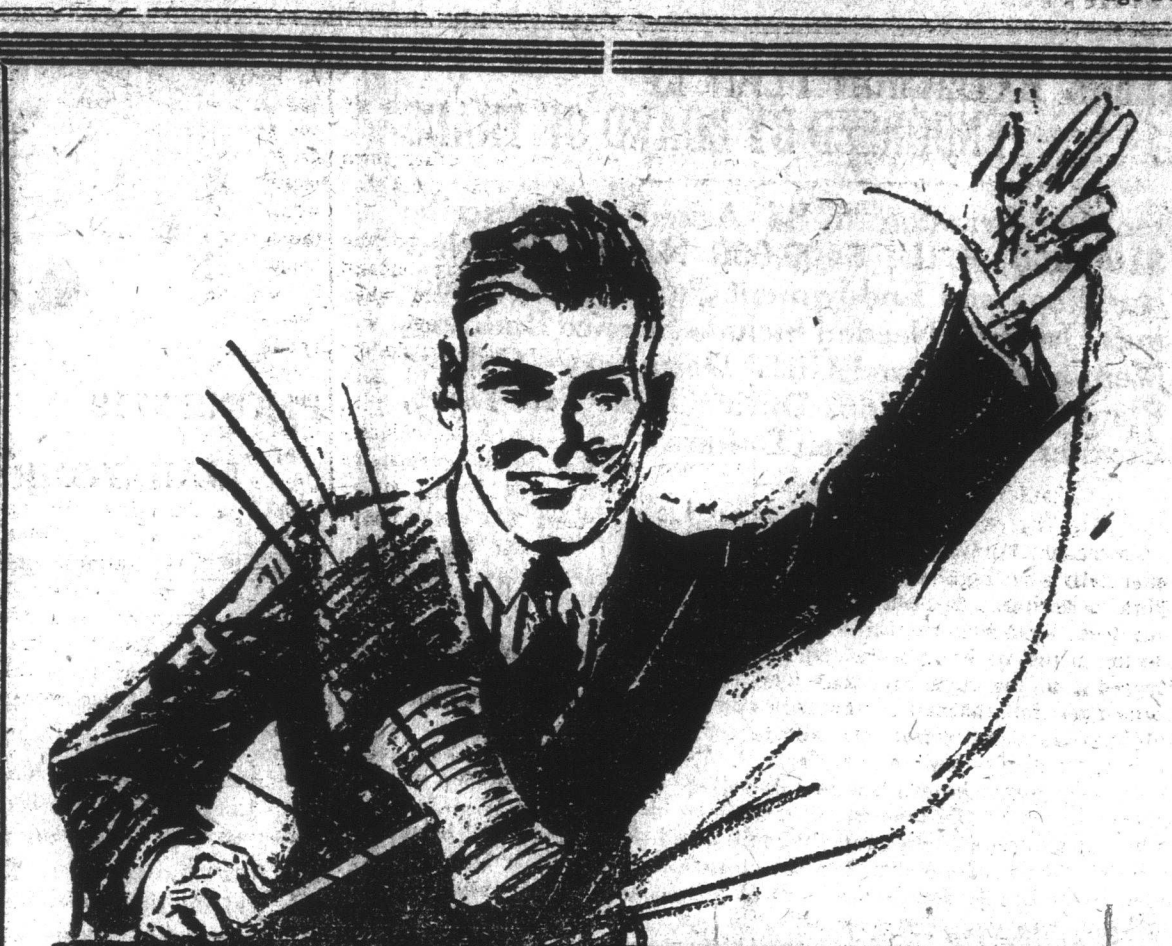
