were going to get the money to

come near me now. I don't love you  
a bit; I never shall, and I never did!

how you'd come and tell me first,  
won't you? And away dashed Bessie  
leaving me at the garden gate, to  
which we had walked during our  
conversation.

It was a lovely spring morning.  
All nature seemed in ecstasy at the  
prospect of approaching summer, and  
I alone was sad. I could not help
