THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

So far as the general public can discern no steps have been taken either to appoint a new Solicitor General or to secure a seat for Hon. Mr. Richard. herst. In consideration of the grea benefit the works would bring to th town, the companies ask that stock the amount of \$40,000 be subscribe by the citizens of Amberst in th

new joint company.

The benefits that would be secured to the town through the building up of an industry such as the new con-cern would be are incalculable. The capital stock would be in the vicinity of \$200,000 and it would mean that upwards of 300 wage earning men, the majority of them with families would be brought to that town. In all probability other manufact industries would spring up there and push Amherst to the front as an industrial centre. The amount a kee from the town is not large, certainly not in proportion to the benefits which would follow. The business is al-ready established and investors have that security which does not go with entirely new ventures. This is ar opportunity of a life time and the merchants and others are indeed near sighted if this opportunity is allowed to pass unimproved.
