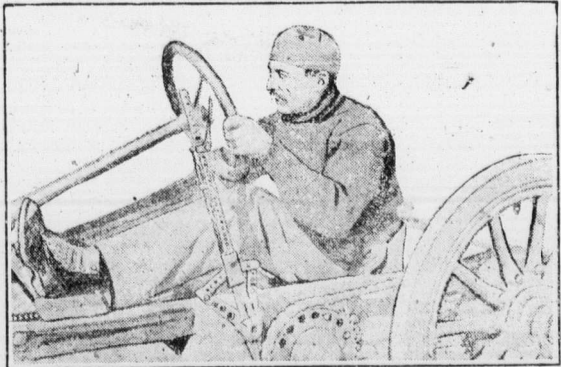

A SWEEPING DEFEAT OF THE LIBERAL PARTY

Is What the Toronto News Says of the Result of the New Brunswick Elections—The Attitude of the Liberal Press Before and After the Eventful March the 3rd—If the Success of Robinson Would Have Been a Liberal Victory, He and His Party Have Made the Sweep Which Wipes Him from Power, a Liberal Defeat.

Some people are confused, and ask whether the election in New Brunswick was a Liberal defeat or not. The cynic will reply, looking at the situation as it is now, that had the result been otherwise it would have been a great Liberal victory. As it is, it is not a Liberal defeat.

Leaving aside the question of how much the New Brunswick governments of the recent past were coalition governments, there is no doubt that this past election was fought out on party lines. It will be noted that all statements that this is not a Conservative victory are based on Mr. Hagan's speech after the event. In which, like most winners, he says he is supported by men of both parties. Similar extracts could be made from the speeches of Mr. Whitney and Mr. Roblin.

SO FAR AS THE LIBERAL PAPERS OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES ARE CONCERNED, THEIR ANTE-ELECTION STATEMENTS DO NOT BEAR OUT THE PRESENT CONTENTION. From the first should be left out the St. John Globe, which opposed the Robinson government, and which says that the result which occurred in 1905 would have occurred in 1903. That the government was saved then was because Mr. Blair intervened, and because "thousands of Liberals reluctantly responded to Mr. Blair's wishes." In the five years, the Globe says, the burden had grown heavier, and Mr. Pugsley was not able to do in 1905 what Mr. Blair did in 1903. There does not appear to be much coalition in that.

THE PAPER WHICH SUPPORTED THE ROBINSON GOVERNMENT LOCKED THE DOOR AND THREW THE KEY AWAY, so far as trying to talk of a coalition government later on was concerned. Mr. Pugsley, in his last address at Sussex on Saturday night preceding the election, is reported as saying that the Conservatives were whistling to keep their courage up. The Fredericton Herald said on the day before the election that the new Legislature would meet on March 26th, with the Liberal government still in the saddle, but with possibly a new opposition leader.

Throughout the election the battle cry in certain constituencies was "Two governments are better than one"—which has scarcely a coalition look.

Again after the Gloucester election (held a day in advance of the general polling) the Fredericton Herald said the Liberals of Gloucester had decided that, SO FAR AS THAT COUNTY WAS CONCERNED, LOCAL POLITICS SHOULD BE RUN ON FEDERAL PARTY LINES. The Moncton Transcript a few days before the election, PREDICTED A SWEEPING LIBERAL TRIUMPH, AND URGED LIBERALS TO RALLY IN TYPE THAT STRETCHED ACROSS THE FRONT PAGE. The same paper declared later that THE TORY TICKET WAS SWAMPED IN GLOUCESTER, WHILE THE ST. JOHN SUN SAID THE LIBERALS HAD CLOSED THEIR CAMPAIGN IN CONFIDENCE. The Campbellton Graphic charged that Mr. Fowler was a Tory M. P., and that he led the party in the province.

After the election some Liberal papers were still unconscious of a coalition victory. The Montreal Witness said that THE CONSERVATIVES HAD WON OVERWHELMINGLY IN NEW BRUNSWICK. The Ottawa Free Press ground its teeth and remarked casually: "Well, if New Brunswick can stand it, we suppose THE REST OF CANADA WILL HAVE TO STAND BY. THE TORIES CAN FILL THE SHOES OF BLAIR, I EMMERSON, AND PUGSLEY."

POTATO CULTURE IN CARLETON CO.

Farmers Prepared to Give the Tubers Another Trial This Year—Last Year's Bad Crop.

Hartland, N. B., March 12.—Dealers in commercial fertilizers say that to the present date they have sold quite as much potato phosphate as they had sold at the same time last year. They seem of the opinion that the soil will altogether be quite as much sold as there was last spring, when farmers went to a great extreme in planting potatoes. This year, however, it seems that the spreading of potatoes will be more general, but no single individual will plant such a great acreage as some did last year, so in the event of another season of almost total failure the loss to individuals will not be nearly so heavy. The potatoes raised in this county last year were certainly of very inferior quality, but as heretofore, the finest of tubers have grown here, it is supposed the unusually wet weather of last summer, was the cause of the poor quality.

Four-fifths of last year's crop has been shipped and on the whole season's opinion the farmers have come out just about square with their expense bill, exclusive of their own labor. The price of potatoes today is \$1.40.

In other lines of produce there is no material change. Hay is in fair demand at \$5.00 to \$5.50; oats bring 40 cents.

FRIDAY THE THIRTEENTH.

Atlanta, Ga., March 12.—The arrangements have been completed at the city prison for the execution tomorrow of the negro Andrew Johnson, convicted of the murder of Policeman J. J. Barker while the latter was attempting to place the negro under arrest. The execution will be private, and will take place between 10 a. m. and 2 p. m.

Johnson, prior to his crime, was well known among Atlanta negroes as the "Black Sport." He was a gambler and had been in trouble a great many times. Two unlucky combinations have followed him during the closing days of his career—Friday the thirteenth. The murder for which he is to pay the death penalty was committed on Friday, December 8th. He was tried on Friday, December 13, and he was first sentenced to be hanged on Friday, January 3, and re-sentenced to be hanged on Friday, March 13.

IMMIGRANTS HELD UP AT HALIFAX

Forced to Pay Blackmail to Physicians Whether Diseased or Not Under Threat.

Halifax, N. S., March 11.—For a long time there have been ugly rumors of wrong doing in the medical branch of the immigration department in Halifax. It has been believed that immigrants were held up on the charge that they were diseased, when there was in reality nothing wrong with them, the hold-ups being made because no rake-off was forthcoming. The Hamburg-American line officials were always very particular in making examinations on the other side, to ensure that there was no trachoma among the passengers, because they did not want to take rejected immigrants back. Nevertheless the doctors here who were in charge of the immigration station nearly always managed to find alleged victims of the disease.

Wm. Roche, Halifax, is the agent of the line and his associates were aroused so that he wrote to Ottawa complaining about it and had other letters forwarded. There evidently was big money in the way the inspection was made for some people. Not only were men and women held up here on a charge of having trachoma when some good authorities either rightly or wrongly said they had not the disease, but the conspiracy spread to the other side of the ocean. There, it appears, the emigrants were asked for money and those who paid were given a pass word or sign which ensured their getting through the medical lines at Halifax.

Two doctors' names are mentioned in this connection at Halifax. One is Dr. H. L. Dickey, whose resignation has been asked for and accepted by the government. Dr. Dickey was in charge of the notorious trachoma hospital. Dr. Murdoch Chisholm was yesterday appointed in his place and enters upon his duties tomorrow. Who W. Dodds, Halifax, is remains a mystery. Your correspondent was unable to locate any doctor or official at the immigration station bearing that name. It is possible that the name is an assumed one.

The conditions at Halifax have long been known to be scandalous and it is believed that the dismissal of Dr. Dickey is but the beginning of developments and that further sensational developments will soon be made.

Guilty Ones Located.
