NEWS NOTES.

PITTSFIELD, Mass., June 10.—The stallion Kremlin on Friday, trotted half a mile in one minute on the Allen farm track. His record was 2:07 1/2.

Mexico will issue in September a new series of postage stamps which will interest philatelists. It is the first series of pictorial stamps issued by that country. They will be in the usual denominations, one cent, two cent, four cent, five cent and ten cent, and will represent by cleverly executed drawings the various stages of Mexican mail transportation, showing the motive power of man, burro, stage and steam train.

A habeas corpus was yesterday applied for at chambers to discharge Henry Jackson from Rockhead. J. T. Bulmer in making the application said that it was on the docket last Tuesday, but when it was called he himself needed a habeas corpus and could not get to court to attend to it. He intimated to the court that it would be necessary hereafter, whenever he was absent, to send around and find just what jail he was in. Judge Henry and the barristers enjoyed the joke immensely.

CHICAGO, June 9.—A 10 per cent dividend on stock of the World's Columbian Exposition was distributed to-day, representing about \$800,000. Of this amount between \$600,000 and \$700,000 went to individual holders of stock and the remainder to the city of Chicago. A final dividend of 2 per cent may be declared before the exposition is wound up. There are a large number of claims pending against the exposition, and also some claims in favor of the exposition against concessionaires and others.

pitchforks round her hut. Eventually they broke down the door, opened the body, beat each other with the candles which took round the body, killed five, and several others were severely wounded. A farmer named Dwyer, near Nenagh was killed in an agrarian quarrel on Friday.

WEXFORD, June 10.—A fatal accident occurred this afternoon to the through Canadian Pacific bridge near Fort William. A burning bridge gave way under a train and four cars were precipitated into the River Mattawa. The cars took fire from the bridge and were consumed with all the mail and express matter. Mrs. Barker of Elkhorn, Man., was drowned and express messenger Brown, of Toronto, is missing. It is also feared two others are drowned. Among the injured are Mrs. Bliss, of Middleville, Mich., badly lacerated; fireman Whitehead, seriously injured; engineer Elmes, slightly injured.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 9.—There is but little change in the flood districts. Reports from all points on the Fraser and Thompson rivers show a rise of from several inches to one foot. At Katz lowering waters are reported for the past 24 hours. At Mission City and New Westminster there has been a falling of three inches. The only damage done lately was at Westham Island, London's wharf was swept away and the water a few minutes later forced a way through the dyke carrying 600 feet away. Several farms were soon flooded to a depth of three feet. The stock was saved but crops are seriously damaged. Some valuable improvements were destroyed. Many are of the opinion that the worst of the flood has been experienced. The total acreage under water is approximately estimated at about 150,000,000. The only distress reported so far is from Barnston Island, where 150 families are said to be destitute. Steps are being taken to afford them relief.

DOMINION DAY celebrations will be abandoned and the money appropriated for the purpose will go to the relief fund, except in Vancouver, which will celebrate as usual. Great indignation is felt here over the false reports sent out from Vancouver that an excursion train had been wrecked on the C. P. R. road 40 miles out. Travel is, of course, greatly impeded and at present no trains are running. The floods caused a number of washouts on the Pacific Coast section of the Canadian Pacific, but there has not been a railway accident of any kind since the beginning of the flood.

DENVER, Col., June 8.—A Cripple Creek special says the miners are demoralized and fleeing from Bull Hill. The deputies are moving in squads of 300 and have so far met with no resistance. The only danger some believe is that the strikers may explode some hidden dynamite under them, but resistance is doubted. Governor White is violently angry at the inactivity of the militia and does not deny he sent it to all strikers.

OTTAWA, June 9.—J. G. Forbes is here, and with members from eastern Nova Scotia and Cape Breton will meet the council on Monday at eleven to urge the claims of Terminal City for the fast Atlantic service. He wants the government to leave the Canadian terminus an open question and has petitions from thousands in Antigonish and Guysboro counties urging this proposal. Senator Ogilvie and the wealthy Americans who own Terminal City will see Huddart and offer to build hotels, wharves, warehouses, breakwaters elevators and other improvements to make the port a first class one if he will use it. They say the harbor is the finest in the Maritime Provinces and is open all the year round. It is only 2,300 miles from England and with railway facilities now nearing completion is secured within three miles for \$2 a ton. Mr. Forbes expects Sir John Thompson will be with him, and believes his project will be adopted, and if it is that Terminal City will be able to offer advantages superior to any other port, there being besides the facilities mentioned no harbor or pilotage fees.—Globe.

After recess all the private bills on the notice paper were advanced a stage, including the bill to incorporate the Nova Scotia Steel company, which was read a second time. Mr. Kaubach gives notice of an order for a return giving the names and tonnage of United States fishing vessels licensed under the modus vivendi with fees paid since 1887. Also dates of departure and return of craft registered, including the tariff resolution, played in the coast protection service on the Atlantic service.
