THE CONGO.

Discussion on Subject in Belgian Parliament.

Brussels, April 16.—The discussion on the question of the annexation of Congo Independent State began in the Chamber of Deputies, which was called yesterday. Very little progress was made beyond the clearing up of preliminary matters.

The debate opened with a sharp attack on the premier by the Socialist leader, Vandervelde, who declared that the Socialists would abstain from obstruction in any way.

The premier then summed up the benefits which Belgium would derive from the annexation of the Congo Independent State, and M. Davidson, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, followed with an explanation of the international situation arising out of the question which the United States and Great Britain had submitted as to what steps were being taken to carry out the terms of the Berlin treaty with regard to the rights of the natives and the liberty of commerce.

It was decided that the debate on the treaty should continue without interruption until May 2nd, when the chamber rises for the elections.

LONDON SCHOOLS BAR KISSING.

London, April 16.—The county council has issued an ordinance forbidding children attending county council schools to play games in which kissing forms a part.

Teachers are instructed to see that such games are discontinued. The reason for the prohibition is contained in the sentence of the ordinance reading: "No medical ground, the practice is considered undesirable."

Cleveland, O., April 16.—Police Judge Levine to-day held that kissing is assault and battery, when the kissing is objectionable to the man. On that charge he fined Jacob Gibson \$25 and costs and sentenced him to thirty days in the workhouse. The complaint was made by his divorced wife.

Meat continues firm, but finds ready buyers. Hogs are dull. Butter maintains its price, with a very poor supply coming in—not enough to supply the demand. Eggs also are firm and the supply of dairy produce is unusual for this time of the year. Vegetables were very plentiful this morning, with a very fine show on some stands. Quite a number of turkeys were to be had this morning, with easier prices. Flowers made a good showing, but not so many were to be seen this morning as on Tuesday, owing to the cold wind and frost. There was one of the finest displays of fish on the market this morning seen for some time. The benches contained piles of good, fresh caught fish of all kinds, at prices that were popular.
