The Contest in New Brun-

swick.

The treatment the Liberal candidates

are receiving everywhere throughout the

City and County of St. John is most grati-

fying to them and to the party they

represent. Of course, regarding the

County there never was but one opinion,

even in Tory circles, as to the results;

that Messrs. Burpee and Weldon will be

elected by overwhelming majorities. If

any different opinion at any time was

expressed, it was only to be regarded as

valued among any portion of the Tory

party, they must have been woefully dis-

appointed when the truth reached them—

if it ever does reach them—regarding

the progress of their candidates through

the various sections of the constituency.

We have made diligent enquiry, and

have not been able to ascertain that in

any place they have yet visited have not

been accorded the slightest encourage-

ment, so strong is the sympathy for the

Liberal candidates. Sir Leonard and

Messrs. Tuck and Everett addressed a

public meeting in Portland on Tuesday

evening, and they were listened to by a

large audience, a great proportion of

whom were trained delegates from the

City. The speakers were not particularly

worthy of notice, except that of Mr. Tuck,

whom the many rebuffs he has re-

ceived during his canvass have put out of

temper. He does not like the references

that have been made to that "0000 job,"

and he was bitterly abusive towards his

opponents. In fact, one would hardly

recognize the jovial, pleasant-faced Harry

Tuck of the past in the present Tory

candidate for St. John City and County.

Another turn of the meeting was the

appearance on the platform of Joseph

Travis, Esq., who has come out flat-footed

in favor of the N. P. It was necessary

to introduce something to enliven the

proceedings at these meetings, and Mr.

Travis will probably be a most amus-

ing amusement as any one they could get.

In the City, where the Tories, a week

or two ago, professed to have such great

strength, there has been a wonderful

change since the candidature of Mr. Mc-

Leod. The Tories are now in a state of

panic, and they are all in a great

state of confusion. The Tories are now

are unable to battle against the Liberal

feeling of the people they seek to re-

press. The Finance Minister's mission

will be futile. The people of the River

County know too well his readiness to

make promises and his incapacity to ful-

fill them, to place any confidence in what

he may now tell them, but will prefer

rather to place their trust in Mr. King

and Mr. Burpee, who have never yet de-

ceived, and who can be relied on in any

emergency that may arise, to do battle

for them.

Mr. Lindsay has accepted the nomi-

nation in Carleton County, but the people

of that County will prove themselves un-

worthy of their present proud record if

they do not send back to Parliament

sturdy, honest farmers, Mr. Irvine.

From what we learn we have every

confidence that Mr. Irvine will be elected.

In Kings County the Tory candidates,

Donville and Foster, are still pro-

ceeding their usual tactics, and the

proceedings, as were told, are not

pleasant as they were at the outset.

Mr. Fred W. Stockton announces him-

self as a candidate in the Liberal list.

In fact, the Liberal cause, as re-

spected to Mr. Stockton, is in a very

good position. We are without any advice as to

the prospects in this County.

In Kent County Mr. Geo. V. Molner-

ey, a young man of brilliant talents, is

proceeding on his canvass with the

Liberal cause. The Tories say that Mr. Mol-

ner is certain of his election, but they

would say this were they sure of his de-

feat. We hope to be able to state before

many weeks that Kent County has

returned to its proper position, and that

Liberal constituencies of the Province.

In Gloucester Mr. Anglin is opposed

by Mr. Burns and Mr. Turgon, and the

strongest efforts will be made to defeat

him; but as on former occasions they

have failed, we have no doubt that

Albert County is about to choose be-

tween its late respected member, Mr. Wal-

lace, and the Tory nominee, Mr. Hog-

gar. The fact that the Tory papers have

scarcely a word to say as to the chances

of their candidate nor look upon the

election as anything but a foregone con-

clusion, that Mr. Rogers retains his well

earned popularity in the County.

On the whole the prospects of the com-

plete triumph of the Liberal party through-

out the Province are most encouraging.

Now New Brunswick may be the next

Liberal Province, it will not be be-

cause of any decrease in the number of

Liberal representatives, but because some

of the other Provinces, which in 1878

were won by the Tories, have returned

to Liberal principles and become rival

claimants for the proud title which New

Brunswick has enjoyed during the

past four years.

The Prospects in Nova Scotia.

The news from Nova Scotia is most en-

couraging to the friends of the Liberal

party throughout the Dominion. There

is no fear that our sister Province will

repeat the blunder it made in 1878. On

the contrary there are good grounds for

hoping that in the next Parliament Sir

Charles Tupper will find the Tories

following nearly to the extent of that of

the "respected and esteemed colleague"

(on the platform), and "weak-kneed" rival

(in the Cabinet) Sir Leonard Bailey.

In the past the Liberal party in Nova

Scotia has been in a very weak position;

but in every other constituency the

Liberal have strong candidates in the

field. Halifax, it is confidently antici-

ated, will return the Liberal candidate.
