Newman Clark to be Hanged March 1st

Andover, N. B., Dec 4-Guilty, with recommendation for mercy, was he verdict returned on Friday a ternoon, by the jury who heard the evidence in the case against Newman Clark, of Four Falls, charged with the murder of Phoebe Bell, on March 2th, as Grand Falls.

This morning Mr. Justice Chandler centenced the prisoper to be hanged on March lat.

Clark received the death sentence with almost the same indifference that has characterised his deportment threathout his trial. He leaned upon a table while standing for sentence, and after it had been pronounced turned partly towards where some triends were sitting, and a grim smile broke over his face.
