**New Beverage  
Playing Havoc**

One is Dead and Twenty-five Are Nearly as Bad Off After Drinking "Croner's Cocktail," Made in a Paint Store

CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—Chicago has discovered a new beverage, a "croner's cocktail," but one should arrange affairs with an undertaker before indulging in it. One is dead and twenty five are hanging on the rope perilously near the pearly gates, from absorbing it.

People anxious to avail themselves of the new drink will be interested to know that it is a mixture of nitro benzole and grain alcohol, with perhaps some minor ingredients, but these are the basic staples. It smells like a combination of benzine and glycerine and gets in its deadly work very rapidly.

Singularly enough, investigation into the latest death and twenty five serious cases show that the new beverage was compounded at a paint store. The men met there last Sunday, mixed up the concoction and went to it. James J. Sullivan who professed a liking for the drink, helped himself liberally and is dead. The proprietor of the paint store had in stock what he supposed to be denatured alcohol for use in mixing paint or shellac.

Deaths from wood alcohol drinking have dropped to the minimum, following general warning during the recent fatal cases here and elsewhere, and finally resulting in druggists and others refusing to sell it until made unfit for human consumption.

**CLUB WOMEN FAVOR  
EUGENIC MARRIAGE**

Detroit, Feb. 13.—Detroit club women through the action of the Board of Directors of the Detroit Federation of Women's Clubs at a meeting today came out strongly in favor of eugenic marriages.

It was voted to support actively the eugenic marriage bill which will come before the Legislature at the next session.  
Mrs. C. E. Kilburn, Chairman of the Legislative Department proposed the following measures which will also be supported by local club women of Detroit. Making wife desertion felony rather than misdemeanor, to increase the mother's pension amount and make the law function throughout the State instead of merely in Detroit, to legalize children born out of wedlock, and to raise the age of consent to eighteen years in all cases.

**French Sore Over  
British Russ Policy**

Paris, Feb. 13.—The new Orientation of British foreign policy, as outlined in the King's speech and by Premier Lloyd George is measured with careful criticism in the French press today. The question of the British attitude toward and intentions in Russia is especially the subject of comment. No alternative policy is proposed, but the writers are agreed that at present it is impossible to trade with the Russian Co-operatives and not at the same time come to an agreement with the Soviet Government. August Gauvain, editor of the Journal des Debats, writes:

"It is characteristic that Lloyd George should put into the King's speech the declaration that the re-establishment of peace and economic life in Russia and the Orient is indispensable to Europe. Such a declaration definitely engages the British Government. Lloyd George forbids the neighboring states of Russia to engage in any offensive against the Soviet Government. After yesterday's declaration she must renounce her plans. France is not able to help her alone in a campaign against the Bolsheviki and she must take this into account, too, that the new British policy is that of the country, not of a party."

Much criticism is also expressed of Lord Curzon's statement that the treaty must be revised. With a kind of surprised and despairing cry at the new British policy, all articles end on the same note, that whatever else is done, the alliance and paity must be maintained.

**MINISTER WOULD  
ALLOW SPOONING  
IN CITY CHURCHES**

Pittsburg, Feb. 13.—Downtown city churches as places where young couples may make love was the suggestion made by the Rev. John Thompson in his address before the council of cities of the Methodist Episcopal church, in session here.

"I am speaking seriously," he said, "in regard to the duty of the downtown city church toward young couples. Every city pastor will bear me out in the statement that here are hundreds of girls in every metropolitan district who have no suitable place in which to entertain their male friends."

"There is every reason why our churches should fit up rooms with cozy corners, where there is not too much light, so that city young persons may do their love-making under favorable circumstances."

**GREAT, NEW GOLD FIELDS  
DISCOVERED IN URALS**

Berlin, Feb. 13.—Two valuable gold fields have been discovered since the Russian Soviet government recovered the Urals, according to a Moscow newspaper.

One field is said to lie 30 miles north of the more northerly mine of the Ekaterinburg mining centre. The Soviet engineers have reported that if machinery were available, these fields would make it possible to increase Russia's gold output by 60 per cent within two years.

Herr. Reiche, a German engineer in the service of the Soviet, is said to have confirmed this report after a personal inspection of the fields.

**SHORTER SKIRTS  
Money No Object, Especially in  
Stockings.**

Paris, Feb. 13.—Dame Fashion, having apparently reached the limit in evening-gowns, has now decreed that skirts for day wear shall come no lower than one inch below the knee next season. Fourteen inches is the regulation length.

Judging by the showings of models by the most prominent costumers, where there is considerable variety in cut and texture, the main rule followed by the designers of next season's gowns is that woman's form must be revealed as much as possible.

While gorgeous materials are generally used, rough goods have been employed by one house for a "house maid gown," designed to meet the present servant crisis, which often forces the fashionable matron to cook her own breakfast and dust the parlor.

Money is no object, especially in underclothing, the prices of which rise in direct ratio to the flimsiness of the garments. Fifty dollars a pair for stockings is not considered expensive, provided they are of the "invisible" variety.

Several houses have provided a sensation by going back to sleeves, or rather an opening for sleeves, which owing to the lack of backs in the gowns and just above the elbow, leave the upper arm uncovered in order to exhibit the heavy Egyptian slave armlets, which are riveter on the arm by a jeweler and cannot be detached.

**STEAMER CHICORA SOLD**  
Launched in 1864 to Run Blockade in  
Civil War.

The old steamer Chicora, which for years ran between Lewiston and Toronto, has been sold to Frank W. Callaghan, a Toronto barrister, for \$4,400. It is probable that the boat will be refitted for passenger service and will be used on one of the Toronto routes.

The vessel was launched in Liverpool in 1864 and was one of the fastest boats of its kind. It was built to run the blockade between the ports of the Confederate states and England. Before the war the Chicora was valued at \$43,000. In 1870 the boat was again called into war service and transported troops and supplies from Collingwood to a point on Thunder bay where the expedition for the suppression of the Riel rebellion was landed. The boat won further distinction in 1874, being chartered as a special yacht for Lord Dufferin, who was then governor general of Canada.

400,000 IN GERMAN ARMY.

Government Able to Execute Treaty  
If It Desires.

PARIS, Feb. 13.—The German army is still 400,000 strong, according to a report received by the committee of foreign affairs yesterday from General Niessel, head of the Baltic mission. In addition there are 100,000 policing forces, officers and non commissioned officers. Germany also is well supplied with tanks, machine guns and airplanes. In the neutral zone alone on the right bank of the Rhine, the policing forces number 15,000.

General Niessel adds that the German minister of defense, Noske, is in the hands of the general staff and that the German government is capable, if willing, of obtaining execution of the treaty clauses by the country.

**NEW ACTION STARTED  
BY SOUTH GRIMSBY**

Judges Refuse to Give a Decision on  
Townships Appeal  
When South Grimsby appealed the decision of Judge Campbell, re the North and South Grimsby agreement over the Q. and G. Road, the Justices who sat on the case reserved their decision.

Mr. McConachie acting for North handed down but the justices refused to give one. Had they done so the case would have been settled for all time to come but as they did not South Grimsby has now made another appeal. This time to the Supreme Court. Mr. McConachie tried to block the new appeal, by applying for an order restraining South Grimsby from appealing until they had paid the costs of the first action which they lost, but the Justices refused to give this order.

Berlin, Feb. 13.—"North Schleswig lost." "A mourning for Germany" are the headings of a mid-day paper which gives a report from Fletsburg. The result, was undoubtedly most depressing for those who hoped against hope that North Schleswig would assert its allegiance to the German Empire.

The paper comments that it is easy to see that a plebiscite according to nationalities, which is alleged to be the most just method, creates many new injustices beginning with the oppression of the cities by the country.

It adds that Germany has done "nothing by newspapers, books or music to inculcate Germany's sentiment in the rural districts."

**"Go Teach All Nations  
Beginning at Jerusalem"**

"THAT'S it," says a critic, "beginning at Jerusalem!" You should correct paganism at home before going abroad to look for it. I do not believe in Foreign Missions."

**The Need of Africa**

Africa was first explored by a Missionary who lies in Westminster Abbey, honored by all nations. David Livingstone was succeeded by other devoted men, who gave themselves unreservedly to the people of the Dark Continent. Triumphant success in some districts—Uganda for instance—is balanced by dull failure in others. Yet the general prospect is encouraging. Through Canadian Missions in that land, men are raised out of savagery, women are enabled, children are cared for, and educated.

Yet Jerusalem was not Christianized when the Apostles went to Antioch; when Philip was sent to the Ethiopian.

**Remember This**

The man who does not believe in Foreign Missions stands today clothed and educated because of Foreign Missions. When did English culture begin? With the visit of St. Augustine, a Foreign Missionary from Rome. Who evangelized Rome? A Foreign Missionary named Paul, of Tarsus and Jerusalem! What if he had gone to the Ganges instead of to the Tiber? Certainly Canada needs more Christianity, but the best way to improve our own spiritual life is to help bear the burdens of the world.

**The Missions Established**

Five Christian Communions in Canada—Anglican, Baptist, Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian—have an extensive mission work abroad. They have sent overseas many devoted men and women. By their work, barriers have been broken down and in every land there is an eager call for more missions, more teachers, more doctors, more hospitals. Now, owing to the declining value of the dollar, it is necessary to double the expenditure in order even to hold the ground won. Until that is done, an advanced Missionary programme can not be undertaken.

**Mass Movements in India**

India is our brother-land, a loyal British dependency. Illiteracy is the rule. Caste imprisons the people and stifles all ambition. British administration has taught the folk the value of peace. English-speaking Missionaries from Canada are teaching them the value of education and the power of the Name which is above every name. Great masses of the people are asking for baptism, but there are not enough Missionaries to teach them.

**A Mandate for Expansion**

All men, who think honestly realize that the Gospel of Christ is unique in moral splendor, in spiritual force, in civilizing influence. It redeems the individual and exalts the nation. It has made the modern world of thought, of industry, of progress. It must go out over all the earth to ease international relationships, to put an end to cruelty and misery. There is free entry for the Gospel in every nation under Heaven. Lift up your heads, O ye Gates of India, and be ye lifted up, ye everlasting Doors of China and Africa, and the King of Glory shall come in.

**The Chance in China**

China is attempting to develop a democratic spirit before the nation is prepared for it. Many of the leaders got their first glimpse of true liberty in Christian Mission Schools. Now they talk of establishing one million Government primary schools. They look to Canadian Missionaries for help in the establishment of normal courses. Was ever such an opportunity before the Church—to help influence the school teachers of a great, new nation of four hundred million people?

**The Call to Action**

Canadians, Churchmen or non-Churchmen, you met the charges of the war with cheerfulness, since it was waged to establish righteousness in the earth. Now hear the call of the Churches for adequate means to continue by peaceful suasion the work which for four years was done by batteries and bayonets. Your Church appeals directly to you, civilized and educated by Foreign Missions of an ancient time, to meet your obligation to that same Great Cause today.

**The Need of the World**

Japan, Formosa, Korea, the South Sea Islands, South America, and not least, the pagans in our own land, need the Gospel. The Missionary is welcomed in all lands. Men everywhere appreciate the spirit of those Canadians who forget themselves in order to serve the suffering and the weary. Idealism in action counts.
