Roman Intelligence.
ROME, Nov. 12
His Holiness Leo XIII. granted special audience on Monday last to Mgr. Eusebio Tadini, Titular Bishop of Pienza, and Vicar Apostolic of Chantung, who left Rome for his mission in China on the following day.
The discussion in Ticino and Basle (Switzerland) will soon be definitively settled by the Holy Father, who will be assisted by the Episcopate, and the arrangement will be accepted both by the Vatican and the Federal Council.
The Holy Father has appointed the Rev. M. A. Rubin Professor of Philosophy and Mathematics in the College of Propaganda. The celebrated Professor leaves the chair which he occupied in the Archepiscopal Seminary of Bologna, where for several years he had rendered remarkable success in the teaching of physical science.

The following despatch has been sent in the name of the Holy Father to the Metropolitan Chapter of Rome on the announcement of the death of Cardinal Bonifacio: The Holy Father has learned with great grief the very sad news of the death of your Cardinal Archbishop, whose merits were so great. He prays to God for the repose of that blessed soul, and with paternal affection sends the Apostolic Benediction to the Metropolitan Chapter.
On the Feast of All Saints, Cardinal Haimon, with due solemnity, inaugurated the new College of American Clerics in the Via San Nicolaio Polentino, Rome. The Cardinal, in his address, stated that the foundation of the college was one of the most important of the Catholic communities in the East. The religious ceremony took place in the church of San Nicolaio Polentino, and was attended by Cardinals Di Pietro, Dean of the Sacred College, Giuseppe Pecci, Sacconi, Ludovico Jacomini, Angelo Jacono, Howard, Bartoloni, Simon and Saverio. Besides these, there were several Archbishops and Bishops of the various Oriental Rites, and representatives of the Propaganda and other congregations.

The *Monteur de Rome* has the following very important note on a pre-arranged subject: The question which occupied minds in England and Ireland a few months ago. "The Daily News" pretends that the Pope has been deeply impressed by late news from Ireland, and that he has charged Cardinal Simon to write to the Irish Archbishops and by the local authorities to learn if the Catholic clergy had really taken part in the anti-governmental propaganda. This information of the *Daily News* is completely false. It is evident that the aim of such a story was to cast a slur upon the clergy of Ireland, and that it was well that its falsehood should be declared by a most competent authority, such as the *Monteur de Rome*.

On Wednesday the vigil of All Saints, the members of the Pontifical Household received Holy Communion from His Holiness at the Mass celebrated by him in his private chapel, and on the following day the same privilege was granted to several persons, who were afterwards admitted to private audience, at which they presented their offerings to the Holy Father. The members of the Circle of St. Peter, who made special efforts to receive in a fitting manner the persons forming the religious pilgrimage, were received in audience on Tuesday morning. The Holy Father, after expressing his satisfaction at what they had done, presented them with very beautiful medals, and bestowed his Apostolic Benediction upon them.

Mgr. Joseph Alfred Foulon, Archbishop of Besancon, who came to Rome to make the visit ad limina, was received in private audience by his Holiness on Wednesday morning, when he presented the report of his visit to the Holy Father, which was received in audience by the Holy Father. The Holy Father expressed his desire to see Mgr. Foulon once again prior to his departure. On Thursday, Mgr. Dubert, Bishop of Perugia, was received in audience by the Holy Father with special marks of paternal affection, and with words of encouragement to this worthy prelate, who employs his efforts in defence of the Holy See. The eminent Orientalist, Herr Rickell, professor at the University of Innsbruck, was received in private audience on Thursday.

During the week, several American Archbishops and Bishops arrived in Rome, most of whom are staying at the North American College, Via dell'Umitta, of which Mgr. Louis Hostie is Rector. The following are here at present: Most Rev. Michael Augustine Corrigan, Titular Archbishop of Petra, and Coadjutor, with future succession, of His Eminence Cardinal McCloskey, Archbishop of New York; Most Rev. James Gibbons, Archbishop of Baltimore; Most Rev. John Williams, Archbishop of Boston; Right Rev. Francis Silas Chatard, Bishop of Vincennes (Indiana), Delegate in the name of the Archbishop of Cincinnati; Most Rev. Charles Scobee, Archbishop of Oregon City; Right Rev. William O'Hara, Bishop of Scranton; and Right Rev. Patrick Ryan, Titular Bishop of Tricomina, and Coadjutor, with future succession, of Most Rev. Dr. Kenrick, Archbishop of St. Louis. The meeting for the consideration of the questions that will be expected, begin early this week. The Archbishop of Baltimore visited the Cardinal Secretary of State on Friday.

Of the seventy-two thousand Catholics in Arieah, N.S., forty-one thousand are Highland Scotch. The Catholic population of this diocese increased ten thousand in the last ten years.
One-twelfth of the inhabitants of Berlin are Catholics—every third one hundred thousand—and the ten churches are filled every Sunday for the different services.
Mgr. Capel said he was sorry that there were members of the church who did not live up to its teachings, and there were other good Christian people

before him who he hoped would pardon him for telling them that they did not keep God's commandments. He would say this to his own people before those Protestants, in which he had before been misquoted. "You are the sons of those who came here in poverty, in the pride of the strength of your faith, against those who had driven them from their native homes by persecution, now stand still higher, go forth as your fathers did, strong in faith and charity, giving of your wealth to those who are poorer than yourselves."

General News Items.
The report that the Vatican will send a Nuncio to the United States is discredited.
In Normandy it is no uncommon sight to see a driver refresh his tired horse with a pair of oysters.
The first boat of the Allan line for the winter service arrived at Halifax on the 19th, and landed her mail and passengers.
Secretary Folger recommends the retirement of four dollars and their use as bullion to keep the coinage up to the legal standard.
The claims of Egypt and Bulgaria to negotiate treaties of commerce with foreign powers on their own behalf, are disputed by Turkey.
Natives on the west coast of Africa have been attacked and punished by British sailors for outrages upon explorers and traders.
"Died of smoky chimneys" is Dr. Duffield's certificate regarding the 745 deaths beyond the average reported in London last February.
It is stated that the British troops were ordered to leave Cairo in consequence of the persistent demands of the Egyptian Government.
French Communists in Barcelona are accused of threatening to make insulting demonstrations on the arrival of the German Crown Prince.
There is much uneasiness among European residents in China, the prospect of war with France being too near to be pleasant for them.
The Minister of Marine is considering the subject of buying in the St. Lawrence illuminated at night by gas, in order to facilitate navigation after sunset.
Mr. Healy, M.P. speaking at Drogheda recently, declared that if Ireland was not included in the promised measure for the extension of the franchise England should not get it.
The London *Lancet* denounces the impudence of an interfering undertaker who sends doctors a circular offering a handsome commission if they will recommend him.
