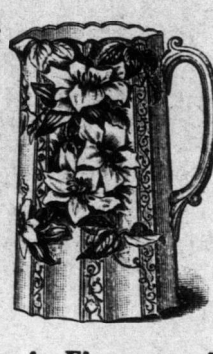

Feildians Defeat the Crescents.

Before a large and deeply interested gathering of spectators the match between the Crescents and Feildians was played in the Prince's Rink last night and the result was a great surprise, as victory perched on the banners of the latter team after the most exciting and closely contested game of the season. An outcome of the match which will be welcomed by the sporting population arises from the fact that the two best teams in the League, the Crescents and Victorias, must play off for the championship honours, they being, owing to the Crescents reverse of last night, equal in points, so that when they play on Monday night a crowded house must await them. The game began last night promptly at 7.30, and the teams lined up:—

Feildians—N. Hunt, Jeffrey, Collier, Piusent, Strong, P. Winter, T. Winter, Crescents—Thomas, G. Herder, Marshall, R. Stick, L. Stick, Woods, R. Herder.

On the start T. Winter made a dash east but quickly lost the rubber. L. Stick now made a dash for goal but the disc was sent behind the net. R. Herder, for Crescents, was on it with whirlwind speed and taking it back banged in No. 1 for Crescents just 2 minutes from the play off. A minute or two afterwards Herder again did the trick, scoring No. 2. It now looked as if the Crescents would win hands down, but the Feildians exhibited a wonderful amount of energy, which heretofore had been dormant and kept Thomas very busy for a long while. P. Winter and Piusent particularly played dashing hockey and the latter, after hot work had occurred in mid-rink, hooked the rubber clear, dashed away and taking a pretty shot landed the equalizer amidst thunderous applause. Both sides now put on a terrific pace and a fine exhibition of hockey was given. After 24 minutes' play Piusent again found the net. A dispute cropped up as to whether the rubber had gone into the net, but the referee awarded the goal. Just after the fact T. Winter got control of the disc and scored No. 3 for the Feildians when R. Herder, who certainly shot particularly well last night, sent it the equalizer for the Crescents. Excitement now rose to a pitch of intensity rarely witnessed in such a contest. When the rubber was again put in motion Gus Herder made a determined dash up the ice, but Jeffrey checked him and passing to Piusent he shot within a few feet of the net and Thomas cleverly saved. Before however, he could clear P. Winter was on the disc and rushed in Feildians 4th goal. Fast and furious the game now waxed, R. Stick was penalized for fouling and received 2 minutes rest, and during the last few minutes of the half Crescents had the better of the game. The teams changed.—Feildians, 4 goals; Crescents, 3.

SECOND HALF. Both teams kept up a wonderfully quick pace in this half but play was clean and often brilliant. Gus Herder led the Crescents on attacking the Feildian goal, and for a while Hunt had his work cut out for him but rose to the emergency and saved capital.

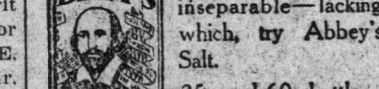
