

To-Day's News.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, To-Day. The British Chamber of Commerce of Paris gave a luncheon to Borden, Doherty and Hazen last night. All voiced the hope that the mission would have the effect of strengthening the influence of the friendly agreement existing between France and Britain.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, To-Day. Sensational developments in the investigation of the murder of Rosenthal, the gambler, who was shot down in front of the Hotel Metropole two weeks ago, came when Police Lieut. Becker, accused by Rosenthal as his partner in a gambling house, was arrested and charged with participation in the killing. He is charged to plead at once to a charge of murder of the first degree. He pleaded not guilty and was remanded to the Tombs.

Special to Evening Telegram. PORT WILLIAM, To-Day. A riot which resulted in the serious wounding of six persons and minor injuries to many occurred at Port Arthur last night when striking Canadian Northern Railway coal dock labourers attempted to invade the town going to work. Chief McLennan was laid low by a club and a desperate struggle ensued, the police fighting over their fallen chief. Some one pulled a gun and as if by magic they appeared in all hands. Firing was sharp and down went the assailant of the chief of police with several bullets in his body. Another foreman was stretched out. Port Arthur City Council, which was in session, adjourned on hearing of the trouble, and advised the Mayor to call out the 96th Regiment if the situation warranted. All is quiet now, though several hundred foreigners are hanging around the scene of trouble. It is said if any one attempts to go to work rioting will break out.

Special to Evening Telegram. TOKYO, To-Day. Within the Palace the death of the Emperor was announced to the waiting Imperial princes and nobilities, whereupon without delay the accession ceremonies were begun at the Imperial Sanctuary. A more impressive scene occurred in the Throne room of the Palace when the new Emperor, Yoshihito, received the sacred treasure of the Emperor and ascended the Throne, before which had been placed a simple wooden table. On these reposed the sacred sword and necklace, two of the three sacred treasures. The mirror, which is deposited in the Shrine of the Gods, is received by the Emperor later. The Imperial national seals were taken over by His Majesty, who immediately arose, and standing before the throne, addressed the entire assembly. This concluded the ceremony. Under the household law the public coronation of Emperor Yoshihito must be held at Kyoto. This probably will take place about one year hence. The date of the funeral has not yet been fixed. It will probably take place within a month at Kyoto.

Special to Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, July 29th. An invitation has been extended to Mr. Winston Churchill to visit Canada, during the next session of the Canadian Parliament, and lend the weight of his advice as First Lord of the Admiralty to the Dominion Government in connection with Canada's naval policy.

Big Steamer Crawls Into Port. The S. S. Manchester inventor, Capt. Everest, crippled into port yesterday afternoon in a disabled condition, having met with mishap off the Newfoundland coast on Wednesday last.

The ship was bound from Montreal to Manchester, England, with a general cargo. She left the former port on Sunday, the 20th inst. Foggy weather prevailed from the outset of the voyage. The early part of the week while going through the Straits of Belle Isle the fog increased in density and the captain reduced the speed of the ship. On Wednesday evening last at 6 o'clock an iceberg was sighted by the look-out man. The steamer's course was altered and in trying to avoid a collision with the Leviathan she struck a "growler"; at the time she was going at very slow speed and her position was about fifty miles to the eastward of Belle Isle. It was discovered that water was entering the forepeak and with such rapid headway that the crew were constantly engaged at the pumps to keep her free. Capt. Everest decided to run into St. John's to undergo a survey and find out the extent of the damage, and on Thursday morning last bore up for this port.

The Furness, Withy Co. are the agents of the ship. This morning the Manchester inventor berthed at the Furness, Withy pier to land her 3,000 tons of cargo, comprising hay, deal, provisions, wheat, oats and grain, prior to being dry docked for repairs. In the meantime Diver Butler is making a thorough examination of the ship's hull. He was working seven times this forenoon and will make his report to Lloyd's Surveyor this afternoon. A great deal will depend upon the result of the diver's inspection. The damage caused by the collision may not warrant the docking of the ship and in that case temporary repairs would be effected and she will proceed to her destination without delay.

The Manchester inventor belonged to the Manchester Line and was so engaged in the freight traffic and is an ideal cargo boat. She is 7,000 tons gross, and was built in 1900. Neither captain or ship have been here before.

DAMAGE TO TRAPS.—At Portugal Cove in the storm of Friday last several traps were damaged, and we learn by the Fogota, that at several places north twine was also badly damaged.
