It is said Carranza decided he was making political blunder by permitting the Mexicans to believe he would sub nit to American dictation, if he de feated Huerta, and this caused his demand for Hale's credentials. Ru nors prevail of disagreement be tween Cararnza and General Villa. which threatens a breach in the Constitutionalist ranks.
