Poultry Exhibition

CLOSED LAST NIGHT.

The poultry show, which had been
so largely attended during the past
few days, closed last night with an
attendance of about 2,000. The pre-
sentation of prizes by Mrs. Davidson,
wife of His Excellency the Governor,
who was also present, attended by
Major Davenport.

His Excellency and party entered
the Rink at 9 o'clock and were con-
ducted to the western end of the
building where the awards were on
exhibition.

Mr. G. W. Gushue, the President of
the Poultry Association, in a short
address, referred to the objects of the
Exhibition, after which the Premier
addressed the gathering, congratulat-
ing the Association on the success of
the show, which reflected great credit
on the managing committee and ex-
hibitors.

Mr. G. W. Gushue followed in a
brief speech thanking those who offered
prizes for competition and called
upon Mrs. Davidson to present the
prizes, which were given to the win-
ners with gracefulness and tact, typi-
cal of that lady.

At the request of President Gushue,
Governor Davidson spoke. His Ex-
cellency heartily thanked the gather-
ing for the enthusiastic reception
Mrs. Davidson and himself. Before
declaring the Poultry Show closed
he congratulated the committee in
charge of the arrangements on the
excellent results of their efforts. He
referred to the expert methods used
in judging and paid a warm tribu-
te to Professor Landry. In con-
clusion, His Excellency hoped that
greater encouragement would be
given to poultry raising and that
next year's exhibition would be even a
greater success, with a bigger dis-
play of birds than this season's. Af-
ter finishing his address and a warm
cheer were given for Governor and Mrs.
Davidson.

We learn that the Committee regret
exceedingly the omission of the men-
tion in the Prize List, that Mr.
Rusch won the special cup offered for
Buff Orpington Cockerels. The omis-
sion was a pure oversight. We con-
gratulate the Poultry Association on
the great success achieved at this
show, both on the popularity of the
Exhibition and on the progress which
has been made in poultry raising,
largely owing to the efforts of the
Association.

That Bridge Again.

Editor The Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—Referring to the item in
your paper of Wednesday re bridges
at the head of Quidi Vidi Lake, I
think it necessary to give a few facts
concerning them. In the spring of
1895 the Department of Public Works
erected two substantial bridges over
each river. Within twenty feet of the
margin of the lake, and they remain-
ed undisturbed until the big freshet
of the autumn of 1906 when the
bridges were carried away. The fol-
lowing spring others were placed
there, and remained for two years.
Since that time the owner of the
marsh land there erected them every
spring for the Department of Public
Works, but some 100 feet from the
margin of the lake on his own prop-
erty and removes them at will. Now,
sir, I contend this is both unfair and
unjust and a misuse of public money.
These bridges should be built on the
public margin of the lake, and should
be allowed to remain for the public's
convenience.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
HALIFAX, Nov. 21.
The Dreadnought New Zealand ar-
rived this afternoon.

LONDON, Nov. 21.
In official quarters here there is a
despondent feeling regarding the
Mexican situation. Hope of a peace-
ful solution disappeared when Huer-
ta's message to Congress became
known. While the sending of British
warships to Mexican waters is said,
officially, to have been done for the
protection of British subjects and
property, it can be said on high au-
thority that the warships were not
sent till the Government was alarm-
ed for the safety of British subjects
in consequence of advices from Mexi-
co that danger was imminent. The
best of the last few weeks that
Wilson's peaceful policy would be
successful has given way to the con-
viction that the masses can be cleaned
only by force, and a long and costly
war.

NOGALES, Nov. 21.
The reason of General Carranza's
abrupt departure from here is said to
be because Hale's leading proposal
was that the Constitutionalists should
lay down their arms and submit to an
election being held. Carranza, it is
said, realized that it was impossible
to comply with the conditions, and
left without seeking further negotia-
tions, looking towards recognition by
Americans.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.
Icebergs have appeared in the
lanes of Westbound Atlantic liners,
considerably earlier than usual. The
captain of the American Line steam-
er Pennsylvania, reported by wire-
less yesterday that he had sighted
three bergs in lat. 43.04 N. long. 47.
27 W. They were described as 100
feet long and 30 feet high. Another,
150 by 50 high, was sighted by the
captain of the Bristol City in lat.
45.45, long. 48. Authorities, however,
do not regard the presence of small
bergs as indication of larger ones,
and the area are not considered danger-
ous to navigation.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 21.
The fact that Nelson O'Shaughnessy
had two conferences with the
Mexican Minister of Foreign Affairs
during the past few days, has just
become known. The particulars are
not given, but it is understood that
the net result was to leave the situ-
ation unchanged. Assurances were
given at the Embassy to-day that no
instructions had been received from
Washington for O'Shaughnessy to
leave his post, but it is known that
his personal affairs are in such order
that he could leave at an hour's no-
tice, if necessary.

NOGALES, Nov. 21.
It is learned to-day from authori-
tative sources that one of the prin-
cipal reasons why the conferences
between William Bayard Hale and
Carranza have been broken, was the
General's failure to give the U. S.
Government assurances that he ac-
cepted the rules of civilized warfare,
if importation of arms and ammuni-
tion was permitted. Carranza pro-
fessed inability to control the gener-
als in the field. He first absented
himself at Carrizal, then at Nacozari,
his second failure to keep his appoint-
ment, Hale refused to confer with
subordinates, but notified his will-
ingness to leave for Tucson. Hale
met Carranza personally, anywhere
if so requested by him. It is said
Carranza decided he was making a
political blunder by permitting the
Mexicans to believe he would sub-
mit to American dictation, if he de-
feated Huerta, and this caused his
demand for Hale's credentials. Rum-
ours prevail of disagreement be-
tween Carranza and General Villa,
which threatens a breach in the Con-
stitutionalist ranks.

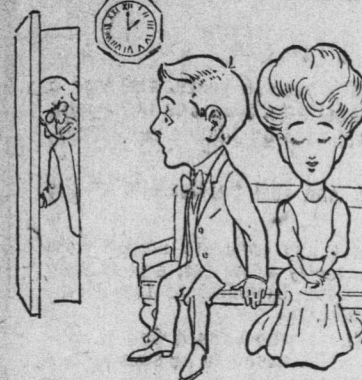

A Billion Dollars Lost Each Year.

Dry Feet Could Save

The International Congress on Tu-
berculosis that met in Washington
last winter discussed the financial
side of consumption as well as its
medical aspect. Prof. Fisher, Pro-
fessor of Political Economy at Yale,
made the statement that tuber-
culosis cost the United States a billion
dollars a year. He based his figures
on the cost of doctors' fees, medi-
cines, nurses, etc., and added the
loss of earnings during the patients'
period of sickness. He went into the
question in great detail, and nobody
disputed his figures.

There were 100,000 deaths from tuber-
culosis in the United States last year.
Probably one-half of those unfortunate
people would have been alive and well
today if they had taken so small a
precaution as putting on a pair of
