STEAMER TORPEDOED.

LONDON, To-Day. The 2,000 ton British steamer Dulcie was torpedoed and sank off Suffolk; crew, with one exception, saved.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

Official (Midnight).—Great activity on the front for the past two days. Fighting north of Arras yesterday becoming extremely intense; infantry actions very numerous and vigorous artillery duels violent and continuous. We have realized progress which is generally maintained, though counter-attacks were furious; again to-day fighting still continues. It is very violent especially in the sector to the north that we progressed, carrying several German trenches on the sides of Road Aix Boulette and Souchez. The Germans are still holding on in Fond de Buval, but they are nearly completely surrounded. We have advanced yesterday and to-day towards Souchez in the direction northwest, southeast and west in an uninterrupted measure; more to the south we took footing in part of the Castle of Carleul, of which trenches filled with water, served as the enemy's basis of defence. We also carried Souchez yesterday and today ground on the slopes at southeast of Souchez 8, Hill 119, thanks to several brilliant charges. The results of yesterday were extended to-day. In the North to the east and south of Neuville, we carried by assault the first line of the enemy, and on certain points the second line; units engaged in the light with bayonet and hand grenades 'neath violent artillery fire. Our infantry, after attacking with extreme energy, being efficaciously upheld by shooting of nearly 30,000 shells, was obliged to face during the night of Wednesday to Thursday, several violent and repeated counter-attacks of heavy German effectives but repulsed these on the whole front of the line. We only evacuated a small wood taken yesterday morning, south of Hill 119 that the enemy's artillery fire rendered untenable; the Germans engaged 11 divisions in the above-mentioned fighting, and these suffered extremely heavy losses. The spirit of our troops is perfect; the number of prisoners taken by us is beyond 600, 20 officers included. Our bombardment squadron has destroyed enemy's reserves at Givenchy, and at Folioval dispersed German troops in formation. The great check sustained by the enemy in its counter attacks against Quevaere is confirmed by the German corpses found in front of our trenches. Long range cannon bombarded twice Villers Cotterets and wounded; at Rheims more than 80 shells were fired of which several incendiary, fell in the city particularly on the Cathedral. In Alsace our successes continue. We have captured Altenhof, a suburb of Metzlar, also Steinbruck, and we continue our progress on both banks of the Pech. The Germans are setting Mezeval afire. Prisoners in our hands number 60, of whom 10 are officers and 23 sub-officers. To the already mentioned material must be added 3 bomb throwers, 3 machine guns, campaign telephones and apparatus for emission of asphyxiating gases. A German aeroplane has been brought down by one of our aviators in Alsace; both German aviators were killed.

Rome.—Late numerous engagements resulted in constant progress for our troops in Tyrol and Trentino, as well as in the Isonzo Valley. At Zulfartoria we have repulsed an Austrian attack. From Rovereto in Covenana, we occupy positions. In Carnie our artillery silenced several Austrian batteries. In Montenegro we have captured 600 prisoners, of whom 30 are officers, and a big number of guns and 3 machine guns. Our troops debouched from Playna, capturing all heights of the region, after serious fighting, fortifying new positions and repulsing all counter-attacks elsewhere. It is reported that the occupation of Goritz is imminent and that the Italian advance guards have arrived in sight of Trieste.

DROPPED BOMBS ON BALLOON SHEDS.

AMSTERDAM, To-Day. The allied airmen dropped bombs on German balloon sheds at Brussels on Thursday, causing slight damage, according to Massbode.

MUNITIONS AGENT.

LONDON, To-Day. David Thomas, the Welsh Coal Magistrate, the Exchange Telegraph Company says, has accepted an appointment from David Lloyd George, Minister of Munitions, to go to the United States to supervise the making of munition contracts.

ADVENTUROUS GERMANS.

BOULOGNE, To-Day. A sensation has been caused here by a report of the discovery of a party of Germans with two armed automobiles hidden behind the British lines. The discovery of a British hospital which was moved several times without escaping the bombardment and shells falling into the British trenches from behind Ledzazarch resulted in an expedition which finally located a party of eight Germans and two automobiles. Each of the latter were armed with aeroguns encased in a cave with fifteen months stores and provisions. Cave and stores had been left behind carefully hidden when the German line was pushed back by the British, while a small party remained behind hoping to put the material to some use. After a time the Germans ventured out and shelled British positions as described. The adventurous Germans are now prisoners.

DR. MEYER GERHARD'S REPORT.

BERLIN, To-Day. Dr. Anton Meyer Gerhard, whose report to the Foreign Minister, Von Jagow; Dr. Alfred Zimmerman, Under Secretary Foreign Affairs, and Count Montenegro, head of American section of foreign affairs, acquainted these officials fully with the status of public opinion in the United States, will be given an opportunity to make a similar report direct to Chancellor von Bethmann Hollweg before the actual work is commenced in preparing the German reply to the second United States' note regarding submarine warfare.

A PAIR OF TRAITORS.

EDINBURGH, To-Day. Robert Hatterington and Henry A. Wilson, members of the Glasgow Iron firm of Wm. Jackson & Co., were today sentenced to six months' imprisonment and a payment of fines of \$10,000 each, for aiding and abetting the enemy in shipping ore mined by the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Co.

NO GENERAL ELECTIONS.

LONDON, To-Day. That there should be no dissolution of Parliament, was the decision virtually arrived at by the Cabinet at its meeting yesterday, says the "Times" today. The Ministers decided on principle that the life of the present Parliament should be extended twelve months and that no municipal elections should be held this year.

TWO ASQUITHS CONVALESCENT.

LONDON, To-Day. Lieut. Herbert Asquith, who returned to London recently from the Gallipoli where he was wounded, is expected shortly to return to the fighting line. Lieut. Arthur Asquith, another of the Premier's sons, who was wounded in the leg at the Gallipoli two weeks ago, is convalescent in Cairo, and expects to return to active service within a fortnight.

WANT REPRISALS.

LONDON, To-Day. The anger of the public press is rising daily over the German attacks on shipping, says Reuter's Stockholm correspondent. Newspapers are discussing the question whether in addition to protests, the Swedish Government should not consider adopting some form of reprisal.

THE RUSSIAN RETIREMENT.


PETROGRAD, To-Day. The admission is made in an official statement issued at the War Office, that the Russians have retired beyond the lines of lakes at Grodek, less than 16 miles west of Lemberg, their last line of defense in front of the Galician capital.

POPE'S NEPHEWS AT THE FRONT.

ROME, To-Day. Three nephews of Pope Benedict, sons of his sister, are now at the front with the Italian army. Another nephew, son of Admiral Della Chiesa, who is preparing to join the artillery regiment in which he is an officer, was received by the Pope.

SUCCESSFUL ITALIAN AIR RAID.

ROME, To-Day. A combined raid by Italian naval sea-planes and dirigibles upon the Austrian positions on the Isonzo front is described in an official statement. Serious damage is said to have been done to the railroad stations and to the Austrian entrenchments. All the machines returned safely to their bases. The Italians




