I am informed that the neew war council, which is expected to be empowered by Parliament to deal with all question which may arise, will be made up of the following ministers, Asquith Kitchener, Lloyd George, Sir Edward sarbia. Grey, Balfour, Bonar Law and Lord Curzon, while other members of the JAPAN BACKS PEACE AGREEMENT cabinet will continue to deal with affairs arising within their department The War Council acting always in conjunction with the Allies, will alone have power to decide the disposition of the army and navy.
