LOSING RUSSIA.

We have been incurably optimistic in our view of the war, but we find it hard to avoid the plain inference of present events in Russia. The situation there is still so unsettled that nothing certain has emerged from it, but the surface indications show it to be growing steadily worse Not merely the folly but the alarming power of the Workmen and Soldiers is exhibited in their selzure of Kronstadt, the key to the capital. Simultaneously strikes recur in many factories and the industries are fur ther paralyzed. The German conquest of the country is nearing com pletion, effected not by arms but by ignorance within. No doubt Germany, if she had the men to spare, could at this juncture make shor work of Russia: but it would be an expensive undertaking and might consolidate into combined opposition elements which can be left to themselves to fall apart. And so Germany wisely leaves them to themselves and secures the double advantage of eliminating Russia and of gathering all her forces to stem the advancing flood in the West. There the first fruits of the pitiful business are already apparent. It is doubtful if the situation can be saved by any number of British and American missions. Nothing but a miracle car save it, and we do not look for miracles in the twentieth century.

The Russian revolution was to have produced many things, and among them to date is a bountiful crop of cynics. The roseate visions that entranced the eves of more impressionable people have not exactly materialized. The event, and America's entry, seemed to give a new meaning to democracy. Already sufficiently elastic, the word has become almost a synonym for every blessing unhappy man can enjoy on this earth. But among the instances of the emancipation of nations through their trans- route. ition to democracy, which writers of all sorts are fond of describing, we have not yet seen cited the most striking case which history contains. Ancient Athens was a pure democracy. It had reached in some directions a height of intellectual and artistic culture hardly yet attained by succeeding civilizations.
