Taking food supplies for the United Kingdom, which was the nerve Centre of the Empire throughout the war, we find that the ships of Britain brought from abroad in the years 1917-1918, nine million, five hundred and fifty thousand tons of wheat and flour: two million, two hundred thousand tons of meat, including hams and bacon: two million, seven hundred thousand tons of sugar, and other necessities of life in proportion while for industrial and war purposes during the same period twelve million eight hundred thousand tons of iron ore: two million, four hundred and ninety thousand tons of other metallic ores and nine million, three hundred thousand tuns of oil, including fuel oil for the Navy were safely landed in the U. K. ports, notwithstanding the menace of submarines, floating and stationary mines and other German commerce destroying devices, some of which unhappily took a full toll of brave lives. Beside the above, pitprops and other timber, paper and paper making materials, jute, fruit and numerous other necessary commodities came into harbours in a steady and constant flow. 


