The Affidavit.

Following is the affidavit of Hon. A. B. Morine, K.C., Minister of Justice, sworn to yesterday in the notice of the action for criminal libel against the Daily Star Newspaper:—

John's to wit:

1. Alfred B. Morine, of St. John's aforesaid, one of His Majesty's Counsellors, make oath and say as follows:

2. That I am and was at the time of the commission of the acts hereinafter complained of His Majesty's Attorney General and a member of His Majesty's Executive Council for Newfoundland.

3. The St. John's Daily Star Publishing Company, Limited, a corporation incorporated under the laws of Newfoundland is and was at the time of the commission of the acts hereinafter complained of, the proprietor, printer and publisher of a daily paper known as the St. John's Daily Star and printed and published in St. John's aforesaid.

4. Harris M. Mosdell of St. John's aforesaid is and was at the time of the commission of the acts hereinafter complained of the managing editor of the said daily paper.

5. That on the 9th day of June, A.D. 1919, the said St. John's

Daily Star Publishing Company, Limited, and the said Harris M. Mosdell falsely and maliciously printed and published or caused to be printed and published in the said St. John's Daily Star newspaper of that date of and concerning this deponent as Attorney-General and member of His Majesty's Executive Council the words following, that is to say:

"Mr. Morine announced that he would use his position as Attorney General, his official capacity as an Executive Councillor, his power as head of the entire police and detective department of the Colony, to destroy the fishermen's organization (meaning thereby the Fishermen's Protective Union) to ruin them (meaning thereby the said union and its members) financially, to bankrupt the Trading Company (meaning thereby the Union Trading Company) the Electric Light Co., and the other companies into which the fishermen had put their money."

6. That on the 10th day of June, A.D. 1919 the said St. John's Daily Star Publishing Company, Limited and the said Harris M. Mosdell falsely and maliciously printed and published or caused to be printed and published in the columns of the said St.

John's Daily Star of that date of and concerning this deponent as such Attorney General and member of His Majesty's Executive Council as aforesaid the words following that is to say:

"If there was ever an inflammatory speech calculated to arouse the entire Northern sections of this country to demand the resignation from office of a man holding important public position, that speech was the speech of brilliant incendiary of Mr. Alfred B. Morine, when he attacked the Union which existed amongst the northern fishermen and told the fishermen that he intended to use his official position in the Government, his position as head of the Department of Justice, the Constabulary and the Police, to put the Fishermen's Protective Union out of business, to ruin them financially, or to bankrupt the Trading Co., or the Electric Light Co., and the other companies into which the fishermen had put their money."

7. I am and have been at all times ready and willing and anxious to help and assist in any way in my power and in my public and private capacity the fishermen's organization known as "The Fishermen's Protective Union," "The Union Trading Co.," and any other companies into which the fishermen, both members of the Fishermen's Protective Union and otherwise, had put their money.

I never announced or stated that I would use my official office as a Executive Councillor to destroy the fishermen's organization, to ruin them financially or to bankrupt the Trading Co., the Electric Light Co., and the other companies into which the fishermen had put their money. I never announced or stated that I would use my power as head of the entire Police and Detective Department of the Colony to destroy the Fishermen's organization, or to ruin them financially, or to bankrupt the Trading Co., or the Electric Light Co., and the other companies into which the fishermen had put their money. I never attacked the Union which existed amongst the northern fishermen. I never told the fishermen nor uttered the words "intended to use my official position in the Government, my position as head of the Department of Justice, the Constabulary and the Police, to put the Fishermen's Protective Union out of business and break up its companies and bankrupt the men who had their funds invested in it."

8. That annexed hereto and marked "A" is a copy of the said St. John's Daily Star newspaper of said 9th June, A.D. 1919 issued and circulated and sold within the City of St. John's and throughout the Island of Newfoundland by the said St. John's Daily Star Publishing Company, Limited, and the said Harris M. Mosdell.

9. That annexed hereto and marked "B" is a copy of the said St. John's Daily Star newspaper of the said 10th day of June, A.D. 1919, issued and circulated and sold throughout the Island of Newfoundland by the said St. John's Daily Star Publishing Company, Limited, and the said Harris M. Mosdell.

10. That the said Fishermen's Protective Union and the said Union Trading Co. and other companies in which the fishermen have invested their moneys, comprise amongst their members and investors a large number of fishermen and other persons resident in this country particularly in the electoral districts of Bonavista, Trinity and Twillingate.

11. That the said untrue statements will cause great unrest, mischief, and uneasiness amongst the said fishermen and other persons and

are calculated to lead to grave disorder and to a breach or breaches of the peace.



Bomb Explosions

In Various U. S. Cities in Homes of Public Officials—Attempt to Blow up a Catholic Church in Philadelphia.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Widespread bomb explosions last night are believed by officials here to be another movement in the anarchist movement for the overthrow of organized government in the United States.

Evidence that the plot was carefully planned was contained in a pamphlet found at the home of Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer, whose home in the fashionable section here was partly wrecked by a bomb, giving warning that "a time has come when the social question's solution can be delayed no longer; class war is on and cannot cease but with a complete victory for the international proletariat."

The pamphlet, one of the large number scattered about after the bomb which had been intended to destroy Mr. Palmer, prematurely exploded and blew to bits the author of the crime, was signed "The Anarchistic fighters," and undoubtedly was intended as a signal to show the reign of terrorism was on.

"I will not drink from a German cup

All foul with German Hate."

At Newtonville, Mass., the house of Representative Leland W. Powers, a son of ex-Congressman Samuel L.


